### TORCH HONOR NAMES LISTED

During the assembly held January 14 the names of the Hermiston high school students eligible for membership in the Torch Honor Society were read. This society is an organization composed of honor students. Miss Thomas is faculty adviser.

The torch was used by the Greeks as a symbol of progress. The Torch Honor Society retains this meaning and uses the torch as its emblem.

The objective of the Society is a serious one. Its members will endeavor to promote good fellowship and encourage scholarship among members and among their fellow classmates. It will encourage students to raise their grade averages and interest them in participating in more of the extra-curricular activities so that they, too, may rate membership in the Society.

The point system governs the rating for membership in the following manner:

- Grade of "1" — 5 points
- Grade of "2" — 3 points
- Grade of "3" — 2 points
- Grade of "4" — 0 points
- Grade of "5" — Penalty of 2 points

Points are given also for participation in such school activities as dramatics, athletics, music and journalism, as well as for holding certain offices in class organizations and clubs.

To be eligible for membership students must have 28 points at the end of the first year, 58 points the second year, 90 points the third year and 124 the senior year.

Students are urged to start watching their grades now! At the end of a semester, using the above-listed point system, they may be able to tell how many points they have earned this year. New students who have records to transfer from other schools are requested to report to the Torch Honor Membership Committee (Mary Sommerer, Dola Mae Daugherty and Lyle Tilden), so that the committee may check their ratings for them. After having attended Hermiston high school for one semester these new students' records will be considered.
