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REPAIR PARTS QUOTAS RAISED

Quotas for the production of repair parts for farm machinery were raised today under the terms of limitation order L-170 as amended by the director general.

The original order provided that production of repair parts for domestic use should be at the rate of 130 per cent of the average annual net sales of repair parts during 1940 and 1941.

The order as amended today increases the quotas of repair parts on this basis from 130 per cent to 160 per cent. The change is the result of WPB's determination that adequate supplies of repair parts be made available to farmers in 1943, particularly since the production of new machinery has been drastically curtailed. It is expected that every machine on a farm that can be used to advantage will be repaired and put into good working condition. To accomplish this, more than ordinary quantities of repair parts are being made available.

The United States Department of Agriculture recommended a repair part quota of 167 per cent of 1940 on a weight of material basis. Under the present amended order, the quota of 160 per cent based on the average of 1940 and 1941 sales, and allowing for the 10 per cent general price increase for repair parts made late in 1941, is equivalent to the quota increase requested by the Department of Agriculture.

HINTS FOR THE MEAT YOU COOK

When the supply of meat is limited it is doubly important that homemakers cook the meat properly so as to get the most from every pound. As a result of years of research in meat cookery certain basic principles have been developed which apply to all methods of preparation.

In general, the tender cuts of meat are cooked by dry heat—that is they are cooked in an uncovered pan with no water added.

Veal and pork chops and steaks are exceptions because they are always cooked by moist heat.

The less tender cuts are cooked by moist heat—by braising—that is brown the meat in a heavy kettle then add a tight-fitting lid and add a small amount of liquid if necessary. Pork chops should be braised without added liquid. Another moist heat method—cooking in water—is used for soups and stews. Cover the meat with water, cover kettle closely and cook at simmering temperature until tender.

Cook all meats at a moderate temperature in order to retain flavor and food values and to prevent excessive shrinkage. Avoid overcooking for the same reasons.

FOOD RATIONING AID TO EQUALITY

The point system of national rationing of food will not only provide each individual in the United States with "share and share alike," but will eliminate some existing shortages, according to a statement issued this week by the local War Price and Rationing Board.

"When the point system becomes effective, probably in the latter part of February, food stuffs now unavailable, because unusual buying has cleaned the shelves, will be back on the market. When meat is rationed, this commodity, so scarce in some parts of the Pacific Coast, can again be purchased but in equal shares."

It was also explained that the point system is the fairest method yet devised to provide for everyone, and at the same time insure adequate food for our fighting forces. Should the demand of our armed forces create a shortage of commodities for civilians, the point system will insure that what is left for civilians will be distributed fairly to all.

It was explained that "point rationing" is a system of rationing a group of related or similar commodities which can be substituted for one another in actual use. The system will become effective immediately upon the distribution of War Ration Book Two on a date not yet announced but believed to be in the latter part of February.

Cut Your Fuel Wood During Slack Periods

Release Transportation,
Improve Forests That Way

Woodland owners can release transportation for war purposes by burning their own wood and supplying wood for similar use in towns and cities.

Fuel-wood cutting according to a definite plan to correct poor forest conditions resulting from mistakes of the past is suggested.

Fuel wood can be obtained from m'sha on trees, dead and insect-ridden trees, other cull trees, from tops of trees cut for saw logs and from suppressed or untimely trees cut in thinning or woodland improvement operations.

Trees suitable for lumber, veneer logs, box bolts or other special products should not be taken for fuel. Large quantities of oak are needed for ships, hickory and ash for handles and lumber and pulpwood for other war industries.

These products can be obtained only from well-formed trees, and cutting them for fuel is a waste of valuable resources.

During Slack Periods.

Fuel wood can be harvested during slack periods on the farm, but some time must be allowed for seasoning. Cutting should also be planned to promote a better stand of thrifty growing timber by removing "wolf" and "weed" trees.

For seasoning, the wood should be stacked, not heaped, on bed pieces over dry ground, and preferably in an open yard to get greatest air circulation. Fuel wood burns more efficiently and yields much more heat when it has dried at least six months.

Labor-Saving Device

Farmers will have to work more hours to reach their 1942 production goals unless they adopt electricity as a labor-saving device, just as tractors are being used to speed up field work.

It has already been demonstrated that much labor can be saved at a little expense in the use of electricity for lights, for putting water under pressure, for processing and handling feeds, for electric fencing and for operating milking machines and brooding pigs and chicks.

Electricity will play an important part in making the development of rural industries possible. On farms where secondary agricultural production is not practiced, the extra time resulting from the present system of mechanized farming may be used to advantage in the shop operating a wood lathe or other wood-working equipment, or on an electric welder making some part or a complete item of commercial value.

Vegetable Insect Control Is Not a Difficult Task

Follow a few simple rules and control of vegetable insects is not difficult.

A duster may be obtained for a dollar up, but one may be made at home with a tin can, a stick and a piece of cheese cloth. Ask the county extension agents how it's done. Next, have ready a supply of insecticides for use at the first sign of insect injury. These are cryolite for control of bean beetles, cucumber beetles, cabbage worms and other insects which feed upon the fruit and foliage of the plants; rotenone and sulphur to control tomato fruit worm, flea beetles, plant lice and leaf hoppers; and concentrated pyrethrum dust for squash bugs, stink bugs, and harlequin cabbage bugs. Watch the garden for the first sign of injury and dust both sides of leaves.

Apply poison bait late in the afternoon for control of cut worms, grasshoppers and adult wingless May beetle, or June bug. Poison bait also will control mole crickets which frequent sandy soils. A bait made of cryolite, finely chopped carrots or turnips and wheat bran will control the adult weevil.

Agricultural Notes

Adequate curing of the hay crop reduces the danger of a barn fire.

Government purchases now take four-tenths of all pork and seven-tenths of all lard produced in federally inspected packing plants.

Last year's shoe production figures smashed all past records, and came within 7,000,000 pairs of the 500,000,000 mark, with an even greater output scheduled for 1942.
