## PEA GROWING TO BE PROFITABLE

Umatilla county growers of both dry and edible peas and canning peas will find maximum production of these crops both profitable and patriotic in 1943. A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county USDA War Board, said today in announcing details of U. S. Department of Agriculture price support and production payment programs.

Canning pea producers may plant the acreage needed by canners for a capacity pack without risking financial loss on any portion of the crop that cannot be packed. Through purchases by the Food Distribution Administration, prices of wrinkled varieties of dry peas will be supported at \$4.25 per 100 pounds for No. 1 grade, and \$4 for No. 2 grade, in bags and on cars at county shipping points.

The wrinkled pea support program, Coppock explained, will apply only to peas grown for canning purposes under contracts approved by the county USDA War Board, but which are not

used for canning. Classes of peas included are Alderman, Perfection, Profusion, Surprise, and Thomas Laxton.

Peas delivered to processors will bring growers \$17.50 a ton more than last year under the department's recently announced price support program for canning vegetables. Specified minimum prices calling for a \$17.50 increase over last year's average prices, and varieties have been established. Canners who contract to pay growers these minimum prices will be certified by the county war board as eligible to sell to the government. Through Commodity Credit, the government will purchase the output of certified canners, and sell it back at a discount.

The purpose of the canning pea program, Coppock explained, is to assist farmers in producing the quantities needed to keep processors operating at capacity. Growers are urged to contract with certified canners for all the acreage necessary for capacity packs.

Besides approximately 30,000 acres of canning peas, at least 25,000 acres of smooth dry peas are asked as Umatilla county's share of these important war food crops. Coppock said. Through purchases by the Food Distribution Administration, prices of five classes of smooth dry peas will be supported at levels of \$5.50 per 100 for U. S. No. 1 grade, and \$5.25 for No. 2 grade. These support prices apply to Alaska, Scotch Green, First and Best, Marrowfat and White Canada.

In addition to the support levels, production payments of \$15 an acre will be paid for dry peas on the planted acreage between 90 and 110 per cent of the farm's goal.

Growers may also obtain loans from Commodity Credit on uncleaned dry peas to enable them to get an immediate return.
