EXCHANGE FOR SUPPLIES SET

Because of the shortage of critically needed poultry brooding equipment, the Hermiston Grain & Feed Co. has agreed to act as an exchange center whereby idle equipment may be transferred and placed in the hands of persons having use for such equipment. Many farmers who would like to expand their poultry operations in line with the Food for Victory program will find it impossible to do so unless all idle equipment is put to work.

New equipment is almost impossible to obtain, with replacement and repair parts also short. Anyone having this type of equipment on hand is asked to get in touch with the Hermiston Grain & Feed Co. where it can be sold for cash or rented for a cash consideration to responsible parties. The above concern will assume full responsibility for the actual cash value of the equipment and will also collect all rental fees from the renter immediately upon collecting such fees and transmitted to the owner.

It is urged that all poultrymen owning brooders and like equipment make an immediate inventory. If surplus equipment is found, list it for trade, sale or rent. While making this inventory, farmers should check for needed repairs and order parts at once, in order to be prepared for the brooding season.

WAAC RECRUIT UNIT SCHEDULED

WAAC Lieutenant Lillian Garrick, recruiting representative for the women's army auxiliary corps will be in Pendleton on Monday, February 22, to talk to women interested in the opportunities now being offered them for service with the women's army. She will be accompanied by members of the Oregon recruiting and induction district staff and will visit this area in the new WAAC recruiting mobile unit. The mobile unit will be parked near the Post Office building between the hours of 9 a. m. and 6 p. m. and will serve as the headquarters for the recruiters while they are in Pendleton.

The visit of the recruiting party to Pendleton is part of an intensive drive to acquaint women of Oregon with the work being done by the corps and to enroll them in the WAAC for assignment to duties which will relieve able-bodied soldiers for combat duty.

The recent expansion of the corps from 25,000 to 150,000 members has opened up new branches of service which provide for a greater variety of assignments for women soldiers and for increased opportunities for advancement to non-commissioned ranks, Lt. Garrick said. She pointed out that while under the present plans all enrollees are enrolled as auxiliaries, a grade comparable to private in the regular army, they have equal opportunities to qualify for appointment to officer candidate schools.

F. S. A. TO AID IN FARM MANPOWER

Farm Security has been designated to recruit, place and transfer year-round farm labor to shortage areas as part of the War Manpower Commission's assignment of farm labor responsibilities to the Department of Agriculture, announces Arnold K. Harrang, County FSA Supervisor, Johns Building, Pendleton. Local plans will be worked out in close cooperation with the County War Board farm labor subcommittees, county agents, Smith-Hughes and employment service representatives.

"Umatilla County's Farm Security office will accept applications for year-round farm labor if it is evident serious shortages exist that cannot be met locally," Harrang said. "Orders for year-round labor will immediately be referred to the State FSA office from where they will go directly to year-round labor recruitment areas. As workers are recruited, transportation to the county and subsistence en route will be paid by FSA until they are placed."

Where workers require special training for their jobs, cooperative arrangements will be worked out with Smith-Hughes instructors, county agents and prospective employers, explained Harrang. Placement will follow in order of application as rapidly as training is completed and workers are available. Many employers, it is expected, will train their own workers.
