Q. Are "Baby Bonds" still available?

A. No. They have been succeeded by Series E War Bonds, the terms of which are substantially the same.

Q. In what denominations are Series E Bonds available?

A. They are issued in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000 (maturity value).

Q. How may I keep Stamps while I am accumulating them?

A. An album is given free upon request with the first Stamp you buy. Spaces are provided for mounting the Stamps.

Q. Is it permissible to name both owner and a beneficiary on a War Savings Bond?

A. No. Either a coowner or a beneficiary may be named, but not both.

Q. When a woman who owns Bonds gets married, should she have the Bonds reissued in her married name?

A. The Bonds will be so reissued, if she desires. It is not necessary, however.

Remember—the longer you keep War Bonds, up to 10 years, the more valuable they become.

Ways to make your meat go further

Making that quota of meat stretch to take care of all those meals is a new experience for most homemakers. But there are so many ways to make that portion of meat go a little further without loss of taste appeal or sacrifice of nourishment, that it isn't really such a problem after all.

**Supplementing Meats** with other protein foods is one of the easiest ways of adhering to the quota. Try serving a half a portion of meat, and adding some other protein food such as cheese, egg, beans, whole grain cereals, pastes, or nuts. Nutritionally speaking, you've sacrificed nothing. As for satisfyingly good meals, your family will welcome the change.

**MEAT SHORTCAKE**—Combine small pieces of precooked meat, any kind is right, in gravy made from drippings or in a cream sauce that has been spiced with a dash of meat sauce. Serve it over piping hot biscuits made from enriched flour. Try it over mashed or baked potatoes or steamed rice, too. It's a way to stretch a little bit of meat a long, long way. And to make the meat go still further, add grated or cubed cheese or chopped, hard-boiled eggs to the sauce. It's got lip-smacking goodness.

**PASTES TO THE RESCUE**—Combine meats with noodles, spaghetti, macaroni, or one of the other pastes in casserole dishes to make a little go a long way. Any kind of meat including vitamin-rich liver, heart and kidney can be used.

**CHILL**—No doubt about it, chill is a hearty dish. If you've been used to making it using only beef as the meat, then change your style and use any of the other meats or food that are available. Not much is needed and the beans contribute a share of the protein.

**RICE CASSEROLES**—A little meat goes twice as far when fixed in rice dishes. Cheese, rice and meat are a happy combination, and there's rib-sticking qualities there, too.

5 Ideas That Will Help You Save Money and Materials

**Tip No. 1—** Compare food prices so that you may be sure of getting the most in quality and quantity for your money. Paying more than you need to is wasteful. In comparing values, be sure to check the weights on packages.

**Tip No. 2—** Buy only what your family needs over a reasonable period of time so that all of it will be consumed—none spoil or be thrown away.

**Tip No. 3—** Make it your business to understand "ceiling prices." The stand prices of one store may be lower than those of another—on the same item. Buy where ceiling prices are lowest.

**Tip No. 4—** Always read the labels, directions and recipes on cans and packages. The producer knows more about his product than anyone else, and this information can be valuable in suggesting many ways to save.

**Tip No. 5—** Switch more of your food purchases to fresh fruits and vegetables. Doing this will save more canned and packaged foods for the armed forces.
