There were 842 registrants for ration book No. 2 at Echo schoolhouse during the three days session starting Monday.

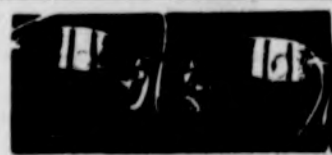
