LICENSE FEES TO BE COLLECTED

(Continued from page 1)

by any other person or at any other place than that specified in the license.

Section 4. Where more than one business, trade, calling or employment for which a license is required, it or shall be carried on by any person, firm, company or corporation, a license shall be obtained for each of said businesses, trades, callings or employments.

Section 5. Every license hereafter issued shall be for one-quarter year and shall expire March 1, June 1, September 1 and December 1 of each year, and licenses shall be required for the following businesses, trades, callings and employments for the following fees:

Auto Wrecking, \$2.50; Beer and Wine Parlors, \$10.00; Bowling Alley, each alley, \$2.50; Card Rooms, \$100.00; Dance Halls, \$7.50; Dart Games, \$7.50; Junk Dealers, \$7.50; Motion Pictures, \$12.50; Music Machines, Juke boxes and similar machines, \$5.00; Night Clubs or Liquor-Service Clubs, \$25.00; Penny Arcades, \$5.00; 4-Compartment Pinball or Slot Machines, \$100.00; 1-Compartment Pinball, \$75.00; Amusement Machines, \$7.50; Pool or Billiard Rooms, \$2.50; Second-Hand Stores, \$5.00; Skating Rinks, \$5.00; Taxis, per car, \$5.00; Vending Machines, \$5.00; Used Auto Parts, \$5.00; Employment Office, \$10.00; Bill Posters, \$5.00.

Except that licenses may be issued for a different period of time for the following trades, callings or employments for the following fees:

Animal Shows, per day, \$10.00; Apartment House, each apartment, per year, \$1.00; Auctioneer, transient, per day, \$5.00; Auctioneer, resident, per day, \$2.50; Carnivals, per day, \$20.00; Circus, per day, \$20.00; Fortune tellers, per day, \$10.00; Hawkers, per day, \$5.00; Horse Races, per day, \$10.00; Merry-go-rounds, Ocean waves, ferris wheels and similar devices, \$5.00 per day or \$25.00 per week; Pawnbrokers, per year, \$25.00; Peddlers, per day, \$2.50; Punchboards, 10 per cent of gross receipts, minimum \$1.00; Restaurants, per year, \$10.00; Restaurants, if beer or wine is served, \$10.00; Shooting Gallery, per week \$2.50 or per quarter, \$25.00; Transient Merchants, per day, \$5.00; Vaudeville Show, per day, \$10.00; Tent Show, per day, \$5.00; Medicine Show, per day, \$25.00; Doll, ring and knife racks or similar racks, \$20.00 per week.

Section 6. No places where cards are played shall contain booths or private rooms and all doors leading to any card rooms shall be unlocked whenever cards are being played or the place is open for business.

Section 7. The term "Peddler" as used in this ordinance shall not mean or be taken to include any producer of products produced from the soil of the State of Oregon, or his employe, nor any person selling nursery products.

Section 8. Each license issued as herein provided shall contain the name, residence and particular place of business of the licensee, the particular business, trade, profession or calling the transaction of which is therein licensed, the date of the issuance and expiration of said license and the amount paid for the same, and shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the office, store, or place of business of said license. Except that licenses for slot machines, pinball

machines or other machines shall be posted upon the particular machine licensed.

Section 9. The City Council shall have the right to revoke any license in case the holder thereof shall be guilty of any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any other ordinance of the City of Hermiston or of any of the provisions of the laws of the State of Oregon or of the United States, and shall have the right to refuse the granting of any license to any person, firm, company or corporation which has heretofore or before the issuance of such license, been found guilty of any such violation. The City Council shall also have the right to revoke any license the holder of which shall not operate his place of business in a clean, orderly manner or who shall permit any violations of Ordinances of the City or any State or Federal laws in his place of business.

Section 10. Any person, firm, company or corporation who shall within the City of Hermiston engage in, prosecute or carry on any business, trade, calling or employment for gain for which a license is required, without first obtaining a license as herein provided, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$200.00 for each violation thereof, and in default of the payment of such fine, he, she or they shall be confined in the City jail for a period of one day for each \$2.00 of such fine, and upon conviction such license shall be cancelled.

Section 11. That Ordinance No. 193 and 198 be and they hereby are repealed.

Section 12. It is hereby adjudged and declared that existing conditions are such that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City and an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the City Council and approval by the Mayor.

Passed the Council this 7th day of April, 1943, by the vote of five councilmen for the ordinance and no councilmen against the ordinance.

Clean as a whistle

Spring cleaning seems to be more important than ever this year because most of us are spending more of our leisure hours at home. But that's not the only reason that this cleaning job has taken on greater proportions. Most of us have to do practically everything ourselves. It's our job now.

Thank goodness for those grand upholstery cleaners on the market today. They are really a salvation to the busy homemaker, for the results are close to miraculous. The dirt that's been collecting all year on those upholstered pieces seems to evaporate into thin air, and the colors become alive again with a freshness akin to new.

UPHOLSTERY CLEANING TECHNIQUE

The directions for cleaning upholstery are usually given on the product. But we've a few hints that might prove helpful. If you're an amateur at this cleaning job, then start out on an inconspicuous spot, say under one of the cushions or on the back of the sofa. A little practice on these hidden surfaces, and you'll see just how to go about cleaning the whole piece. But don't try to cover the whole cushion or sofa at once. Take a small space at a time and clean it thoroughly before going on to the next surface. It takes a little patience and time, but you're well-paid for the trouble. Usually, one application is enough, but if the piece is quite soiled, then give it a second cleaning when thoroughly dry.

CLEANING NON-WASHABLE DRAPERIES

This same upholstery cleaner is also grand for draperies which can't be washed. Shake the draperies and air them well, but keep them in the shade while they are airing. Then clean as you would upholstery, pressing when dry.
