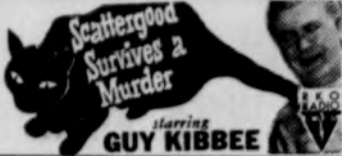


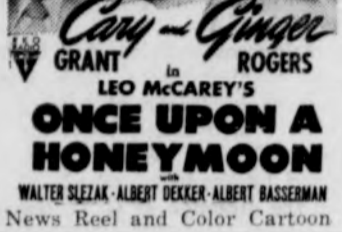

### 4-H CLUB SUMMER SCHOOL SET FOR JUNE 1 TO 11

The twenty-ninth annual 4-H club summer school at Oregon State college has finally been definitely approved by all agencies concerned and is scheduled for June 1 to 11, announces H. C. Seymour, state club leader in the Extension service. The plans for the session were held up pending final approval from the office of defense transportation for the use of school buses to transport club members to and from the campus in cases where trains and regular buses could not handle this traffic.

This will be the second club summer session since America entered world war II, and more recognition will be given this year than last to the emergency conditions. Thus, county extension leaders have been instructed that the first duty of 4-H club members who are old enough to help with farm work is to make sure that

such labor is cared for before attending summer session. In case emergency labor problems should arise on the farm home of any youngster at the session, he or she will be released immediately to return home, says Seymour.

Club members will be housed this year in Snell hall and in fraternities and sororities. The men's dormitory, ordinarily used, and Waldo hall are being either used by or reserved for the army.
