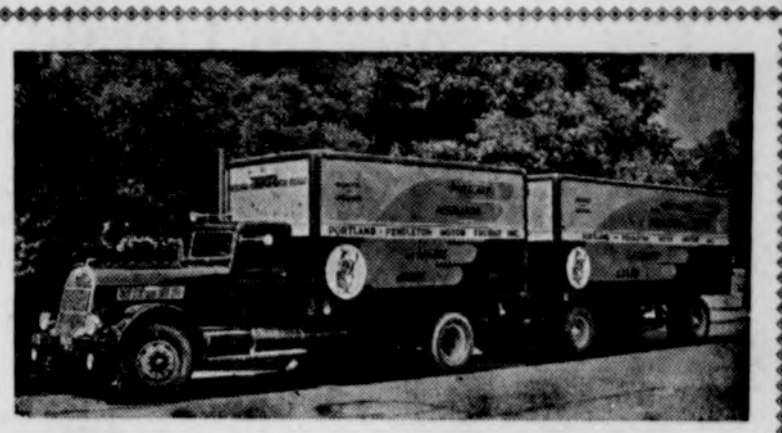
BOARDMAN NEWS
