CANNING SUGAR TO BE AVAILABLE

Procedure by which housewives will obtain sugar for home canning and freezing of this season's fruit crop on and after May 15 was released today by the Office of Price Administration.

As previously announced by Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown, sugar for home canning is being allotted on substantially the same basis as last year—that is, one pound for each four quarts (or eight pounds) of the finished product, and by essentially the same procedure written application to the local board.

A top limit of 25 pounds of sugar per person is set in the new regulation.

tions, which become effective May 15. The OPA emphasizes, however, that the 25-pound figure is a maximum, to be granted only in the relatively few cases where this large amount of fruit will be canned and preserved.

Last year there was no nation-wide ceiling over the amount that was allowed each person, but many local boards set individual limits of 10 or 15 pounds, while others granted individual amounts as high as 45 pounds. The new limit of 25 pounds per person assures more uniform treatment although it is not expected that many families will apply for the maximum amount.

Within the 25-pound per person limit, any family can apply for sugar to put up jams, jellies, and preserves at the rate of five pounds per individual. This is a more generous allowance than last year, when sugar for preserves was limited to one pound per person.

"These provisions are in keeping with my preliminary announcement that OPA would make enough sugar available so that housewives can take the fullest advantage of the new fruit crop and provide their tables with these important foods," Brown stated. He added:

"The more fruit and vegetables put up at home, the less demand there will be on the limited civilian supply of commercially packed foods. I earnestly appeal to those who home-can fruits and vegetables to use their processed foods sparingly. It must be remembered that millions of war workers and others in essential industries have neither the time nor the facilities to put up fruits and vegetables at home. They must depend entirely on commercially-packed foods. Every can of the commercial pack that is saved for these folks through home canning is a direct and important contribution to our war effort. We can run the total into hundreds of millions of cans. Let's do it."

"We have allowed increased amount of sugar this year for jams, jellies and preserves so that these can be used more extensively as a spread to stretch the butter and margarine ration."

GAME BOARD TO MEET SATURDAY

The Oregon State Game Commission will meet at 10:00 o'clock, Saturday morning, June 12, at its offices in 616 Oregon Building, Portland, for the purpose of holding a public hearing and making findings relative to the 1943 hunting regulations as specified by law.

Consideration will be given at that time to seasons, bag limits and other regulations governing the taking of big game, game birds and fur-bearing animals.

FARM ELECTRICAL EXTENSIONS ARE NOW STEPPED UP

The War Production Board has announced a plan for expediting construction of urgent rural electrical extensions in connection with the government's food production program. A procedure has been adopted to release certain types of copper conductor from frozen stocks for a temporary period ending April 1, 1943, for constructing rural extensions already authorized under supplementary order P-46-C.

P-46-C was issued by the War Production Board on January 20, 1943, to permit short rural extensions along existing rural lines as a means of relieving the farm labor shortage and increasing food production. In accordance with long settled War Production Board policy, the order stipulated that the new construction must be with steel wire. Since the spring of 1942, the War Production Board has prohibited the use of copper conductor for electric extensions where steel could be used as a substitute. Stocks of copper have thus been conserved for purposes which can only be served by copper.

Arrangements have now been worked out to make additional supplies of steel wire available for rural extensions. However, pending arrival of steel wire from wire mills, a limited amount of frozen copper stocks in the hands of utilities will be released at once, to permit construction of urgent extensions which can be undertaken immediately.

The procedure is applicable alike to private utilities and public cooperatives. Releases of copper will be made upon the basis of individual applications in the case of each extension. It will be necessary for the application to certify that the extension complies with the standards of P-46-C, and to state the amount of conductor required and the reasons why construction should not be deferred pending shipment of steel wire.

In the case of R.E.A. cooperatives, distribution of the steel wire is being coordinated by the R.E.A. in accordance with arrangements worked between the War Production Board and that organization.
