### LOCAL SEWER TO BE READY SOON

erage town of its size. The system and plant was designed by R. H. Corey of Portland, who is thorough, competent and efficient in such matters.

This is not a flusher type system, which is a matter of necessity, owing to local conditions, but does not make it any less efficient. Hermiston is not over-supplied by a good water supply. The distribution lines are inadequate and the lack of fire protection is a constant menace. It

would appear foolish to further tax the system with flusher tanks for the sewers.

From time to time I have heard some criticism about the cleanouts and the use of tees instead of wyes for taps. Such criticism is caused by an absolute lack of knowledge regarding such things. A great many towns and cities use tees altogether, and cleanouts instead of flush tanks. There will be sufficient flow in all the lines to guarantee their efficient operation.

The disposal plant is a biofilter type which is trim and neat, compact and efficient as well as economical. It consists of pump pits, pump house, chlorinator, primary and secondary clarifiers, digester, chlorine contact pool and sludge beds.

The raw sewage enters the pits at the north end of the plant; is then pumped into the primary clarifier where it is partly segregated, and flows from there to the primary filter tank by gravity and is filtered through four feet of rock; it then goes into the secondary filter by gravity flow where it goes through another clarifying process and from there into the recirculating pit. Part is then pumped into the digester and part into the secondary filter. The sewage is then completely purified.

The action is bacteria and biofiltration. The final route is through a line back to a point near where it entered the plant and is discharged into a chlorine contact pool where it is chlorinated and slowly flows from the pool as clear clean water and into the drainage ditch.

#### STRAWBERRY PRESERVES

4 lbs. berries 3 lbs. sugar  
Pick over, wash, and hull the berries. Add the sugar to the strawberries, and heat gently until the sugar dissolves and the juice is drawn from the berries. Cook rapidly until the fruit is plump and translucent and the syrup thick. Pack carefully in clean, hot jars and seal. All berries except blackberries may be made into preserves by this method.
