RENT LAWS MUST BE OBSERVED

Donald C. Stout, investigator with the district office of the Office of Price Administration, Rent Division, is in Pendleton for a few days checking on compliance with the rent regulation in the Pendleton Defense Rental Area, it was announced by Raley Peterson, area rent director today.

Of particular concern is failure of landlords to register housing accommodations which have recently been rented for the first time. Mr. Stout pointed out that failure to register a housing accommodation first rented after October 1, 1942, within 30 days after it is rented, would constitute a violation of the regulation. Other landlords who should have registered before have failed to register with OPA because of ignorance of the law. These landlords should likewise register immediately in order to avoid possible violation.

All property of any nature which is rented as dwelling accommodations must be registered with the rent control office of the Office of Price Administration, where registration forms may be obtained either by mail, or by calling for them at the office which is located at 203 Johns Building, Pendleton, Oregon.

Mr. Stout further observed that many people are now renting furnished rooms who never did so before; some of them are not aware of the fact that they must register these rooms just as any other owners of rented property must register.

Around the table with a pound of meat

It's quite a trick to make a pound of meat go all around the table and satisfy all the appetites. The secret is to use the meat in tiny pieces, so that the flavor is distributed. Nutritionally, it's sound practice and one we can well afford to adopt these days.

CHOP SUEY—Cut meat into tiny pieces, brown in hot fat, add sliced celery, onions, shredded cabbage (in lieu of bean sprouts), and seasonings to taste. Add a little water, cover pan and simmer for 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Thicken the broth slightly with flour or cornstarch. Serve over steaming, fluffy rice.

RUSSIAN MEAT BALLS—Mix together a pound of ground meat, 4 or 5 boiled, chopped potatoes, 1 grated onion, and salt and pepper. Form into small balls and brown in hot fat. Add a little milk or water, cover pan and simmer gently for 15 minutes. Thicken pan liquor with flour and serve over meat balls.

NOODLE DELIGHT—Saute small pieces of meat and mix with cooked noodles, cooked green beans or okra, and wedges of fresh tomato. Pour in greased casserole and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes or until heated through and flavors are blended.

MEAT PIE—Dice a pound of meat and prepare as for stew, using several vegetables cut in uniform pieces. Thicken gravy slightly and pour stew into greased casserole. Cover top with pastry or with mashed potato or corn-meal crust. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) for 20 minutes or until well browned.

NEW VEHICLE LAWS TO EFFECT ALL DRIVERS

Oregon's new financial responsibility law became effective Wednesday, June 9, along with changes in four other motor vehicle laws of this state, enacted at the 1943 session of the state legislative assembly.

Laws effective after June 9:
1. The financial responsibility law which provides that persons involved in traffic accidents must be able to show proof of financial responsibility

or their driver's licenses and registration plates may be revoked.

2. The repeal of the law requiring every driver to take the state driver's license examination at least once every four years. Also repealed is the law requiring persons 70 years of age or older, who hold current licenses, to take the examination for renewals.

3. The extension of the 1941-1943 driver's license period through the following two years. This enables holders of current licenses to drive till June 30, 1945, without renewals.

4. Reduction in the fee for medical care of indigent accident victims from fifty cents for the two year period to twenty-five cents. This means that driver's licenses now cost \$1.25 instead of \$1.50.

5. The law permitting the moving of unlicensed vehicles from one point to another in this state for the flat fee of one dollar. Previously the fee for commercial vehicles was one-twelfth of the regular fee while the fee for private passenger cars was fifty cents.
