We Will Save Rome

We cannot stop doing these things until the war is over, nor until the peace treaties are completed, and the plans for the prevention of another war are made. Because we are at present victorious on all our fronts does not mean complacency on our part.

MOTORS PLAY BIG PART IN CONFLICT

The present war probably will be called "World War II", but it rightfully could be named a "War of Motors."

"The extent to which this motorization of warfare has expanded staggers the imagination, said Colonel A. S. Buyers, Commanding Officer of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

"It is the job of the Field Service Division of the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces, to supply and maintain a great majority of these motors," he explained.

"Compare the infantry division of the last war, only 25 years ago. At that time it had 3200 automotive horsepower, and today the modern motorized division having almost fifty per cent less personnel has approximately 400,000 horsepower.

"Simple arithmetic will show that this is an eleven thousand per cent increase.

"From the reports which I have received, it is quite obvious that victory will come to those nations who can design, produce and maintain the best and most motors. With our long experience in mass production methods there is no doubt as to our ability to outstrip any other nation or even group of nations."
