**MOTORISTS TOLD TO SIGN COUPONS**

Motorists who failed to endorse all coupons in their new "A" mileage ration books before next Thursday, July 22, when they become eligible for gasoline purchases may subject themselves to a penalty of losing all or part of their rations, Richard G. Montgomery, OPA district director, announced today.

In the past it has not been necessary to endorse the coupons until they were actually used to buy gas. Montgomery explained, but immediate endorsements are now required under a new OPA amendment, both as a protection to the public and as a help to OPA investigators in checking misuse of ration coupons falling into the hands of persons not entitled to them. Montgomery pointed out:

"The new requirement also means greater protection to the motorist whose book is lost or stolen, "Montgomery declared, "since the finder or thief will not be able to pass off the coupons as his own by writing in his own license number."

The endorsement must be made on the face rather than on the back of coupons in the case of any new type

**Dressings give sparkle to salads**

If you want those summertime salads to be devoured right down to the last shred of lettuce, then use a dressing that will change the ordinary salad into one of those delicious creations which every member of the family attacks with gusto! Doesn't matter whether it's the old-fashioned kind or a favorite from your grocery. By the way, the cooked mayonnaise given below is a cross between mayonnaise and the salad dressing that's so popular nowadays.

**COOKED MAYONNAISE**

- 2 egg yolks 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tps. mustard 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 tsp. salt 1 cup salad oil
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne 1 tsp. shortening
- pepper 1/2 cup enriched flour
- 1/4 tsp. garlic salt 1 cup water
- 1/4 tsp. celery salt 1/2 cup enriched flour
- 1/4 tsp. paprika 1 cup water

a. Combine egg yolks, seasonings and vinegar in deep mixing bowl.

b. Add oil without stirring.

c. Make sauce: Melt shortening in top of 1-qt. double boiler. Add flour and gradually add water, stirring until smooth. Cook over rapidly boiling water until mixture is thick and smooth, about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

d. Pour hot, cooked sauce into bowl with oil and vinegar mixture and beat with rotary beater until smooth and fluffy, about 3 minutes.

e. Store in covered jar in cool place. Makes 1 pt.

**HOMAYONNAISE**—Beat together 1 egg yolk, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard and 1/2 tsp. sugar. When frothy, add 1 tbsp. vinegar or lemon juice and beat again. Beat in salad or olive oil very gradually, adding just a few drops at a time to prevent curdling, until 3/4 cup oil has been added. When mixture thickens, add another tbsp. vinegar or lemon juice and beat again.
