### DEPOT WORKERS SHIP WEAPONS TO FORCES ABROAD

"Every worker in the Umatilla Ordnance Depot of the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces has again played an important part in another spectacular and successful military operation," said Colonel Buyers, the Commanding Officer, in referring to the recent invasion of Sicily.

"The depot workers will not get medals, but just as many others in and out of uniform, they can well rest in the reflected glory of an overall job well done.

"When the assault troops went ashore, they had nothing more to help them than the weapons they carried in their hands and the ammunition in their belts. Depot workers shipped these weapons and ammunition to our forces abroad. Stripped down Ordnance maintenance troops accompanied the assault troops to service the light weapons they carried with spare parts supplied by Ordnance Field Service depots.

"I believe it is most appropriate to say that no where was the axiom of these maintenance soldiers that: 'A rifle serviced in the front line and returned to immediate use can be worth thousands sixty miles away across the Mediterranean', more applicable.

"Following the initial assault troops came transports with additional troops and heavier equipment accompanied by maintenance soldiers trained and equipped to service every piece of ordnance out of action due to battle or mechanical failure.

"Here again the depot worker has played an important part in preparing the ammunition, packing it so that it could be handled expeditiously, and protected against the elements of salt water and spray, and the possible necessity of just throwing it overboard and depending upon the tide to carry it ashore. Spare parts for quick and efficient replacement receive the same attention from the depot worker as does ammunition. No matter what specific part is needed to return a disabled weapon or vehicle to action it must be available and be in such condition that it may fit into proper place without the necessity of any modification or even cleaning off one speck of rust. It is well known that a little dust or rust can put out of action the finest of equipment.

"When the landing became definitely secure and the success of the venture reasonably certain, Ordnance depot companies came ashore with the large stocks very similar to those carried at the Umatilla Ordnance Depot and other Ordnance Field Service depots. Here the troops may obtain whatever they need to assure the continued success of the initial assault troops. That is a tremendous job when we consider that many of the 700,000 complete items and spare parts supplied by Ordnance Field Service are involved.

"Every one of these items, be it the soldier's rifle or its ammunition to the thirty-two ton tanks, started on its way to victory at an Ordnance Field Service depot assisted by the patriotic and willing men and women working therein."
