MANY CONNECT TO CITY SEWER

A total of 52 permits have been issued by Charles Taylor to Hermiston residents and business houses for connection to the new city sewer. A majority of the ditches have been dug by F. P. Sargent Construction Co. although some citizens are digging their own ditches. The city council has recently passed an ordinance calling for connections within 90 days unless for "good and sufficient" reasons some extension of time is granted.

It is hoped that many more connections will be made in the near future in order to assure efficient operation of the sewage disposal plant.

CHANGE LISTED FOR EXTRA GAS

Provisions for allowing ration holders to use "B", "C", "E" and "R" gasoline coupons beyond the fixed period for which they were issued and until renewals are obtained were announced this week by the district OPA.

This is the effect of an amendment to the gasoline rationing regulations substituting "earliest renewal dates" in the case of supplemental, official, fleet and non-highway rations for "expiration dates", previously used. The amendment also provides for issuing all "B" ration books for a fixed 3-months period, rather than on a "time-tailored" basis. Individual rations will be tailored by tearing out coupons. In the Eastern shortage area, "B" books will continue to be issued for 4 months.

KENNISON NOW DECK TRAINEE

Clarence A. Kennison, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Kennison who is stationed at Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, N. Y., has been assigned to the Deck Training Department for advance instruction in becoming a merchant seaman to deliver cargo to the battlefronts of the world.

QUOTA SMALLER FOR SEPTEMBER

SALEM—Oregon's draft quota in September will be less than 50 per cent of the August quota, which is the highest in history, Col. Elmer V. Wootton, state selective service director, said today.

With the September call, all available men without children in Oregon will have been drafted, excluding those deferred for occupational physical reasons.

About 600 men reach the age of 18 each month, the colonel said, making them eligible for the draft.
