Artificial Feeding of Orphaned Animals

The feeding of newly born orphaned domestic animals is frequently attempted, but not entirely with success because of the many and varied factors that are involved.

It is an established fact that in the nutrition of young animals milk derived from a member of its own species is always superior to that from others. This at once sets up a serious obstacle in the artificial feeding of all young creatures excepting the calf because cows' milk is the basis of almost all artificial feeds.

In artificial feeding there is danger of overfeeding. The general rule to

follow is to have the young creature still hungry when it has taken its allotted amount. There is far more danger in overfeeding than in underfeeding in the case of newly born creatures. During the first few days of life the feeding should be comparatively frequent, at least every two hours, and gradually reducing this to three to four times per day.

For the very young animals it is advisable to heat the milk to body temperature, especially during the colder seasons of the year. The attendant must exercise his judgment in the matter, based largely on his personal eating experience.

One of the gravest errors in the artificial feeding of young animals is a disregard for cleanliness. The food, the utensils in which it is stored, those from which it is fed, and its handling must be as scrupulously clean as in the artificial feeding of the human infant. Otherwise diarrhea and digestive disturbances are certain to follow.

It is generally held to be advisable, if possible, for the newly-born to receive the first milk secreted by its mother, though no really sound reason has been advanced for this practice. The colostrum is lower in water content and sugar, and higher in protein, largely because of the albumen and globulin, and fat. It is stated that the colostrum is laxative and is needed to initiate bowel movements in the newly born, though experience seems to deny this function. There is better foundation for the belief that colostrum confers measurable immunity against some infections during the highly susceptible period of early life. The evidence seems to be that newly-born animals that do not receive colostrum or a substitute for it frequently succumb in a few days as a result of some infection. A reliable substitute is the oral or subcutaneous administration from one to eight ounces of blood serum depending upon the size of the young creature, derived preferably from its mother; if not obtainable from this source it should at least be from a member of the same species.
