SHOTGUN SHELLS TO BE RELEASED

Hermiston sportsmen were elated Wednesday with the announcement by the war production board that sufficient materials to manufacture 100,000,000 shotgun shells would be released by that group. Although this seems like a large number it is only one-sixth of the output in peacetime years. No shotgun shells were manufactured last year whatever.

Just what allotment will be received here has not been determined but whatever amount is received will be more than was originally expected.

NEW BAYONETS NOW IN SERVICE

American combat units on all battlefronts are now being supplied with a shorter, lighter and sturdier bayonet by the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces.

According to Col. A. S. Buyers, commanding Umatilla Ordnance Depot, strategic materials saved through development of the new bayonet total 362 tons of high carbon steel from estimated 1943 production and 560 tons from the forecast of 1944 production.

The blade of the bayonet has been shortened six inches (from 16 to 10 inches), its weight reduced considerably, and its battle use improved. The new bayonet, like the old one, is flat or sword-like in appearance. It may be used as a trench knife, is easy to handle, and has been especially welcomed by jungle fighters, paratroops, and air-borne infantry.

Japs still retain the flat, razor-sharp bayonet on their rifles. About a year ago, however, the British changed from a blade 12 to 16-inches long to a 7-inch triangular blade. The Russians still continue to use a triangular blade which is issued without a scabbard and is seldom taken from the rifle. The French bayonet is long, round and sharpened to a needle point.

Bayonet drill, despite long range mechanized and aerial warfare, is still standard training in the American Army.

CIVIL SERVICE SEEKS MORE HELP

Applications for the position of Price Panel Coordinator for the Of-

Office of Price Administration, State of Oregon, and the counties of Wahiakum, Cowlitz, Clark, Skamania, and Klickitat, State of Washington, are being sought by the United States Civil Service Commission, Victor Adleman, local secretary, announced today.

The salary for this position is \$3,162 a year, including overtime compensation.

There is no written test and no maximum age limit.

Complete information and forms for applying may be obtained from Mr. Adleman at Hermiston, or from first or second class post offices. Applications will be accepted until August 14, 1943.

Applications are not desired from persons engaged on war work unless the position applied for requires the use of higher skills than the worker is using in his present employment. A Certificate of Availability from former employer or from the U. S. Employment Service may be required before appointment.

OREGON LAGS IN WAR BOND SALES

Umatilla county was partially responsible for Oregon's failure to reach its war bond quota in July, according to totals just received at state headquarters and announced by state chairman, E. C. Sammons. This is the first time in 11 months Oregon has failed to meet its quota.

Sales in Umatilla county totaled \$149,642, or 78 percent of the county's quota of \$190,000. Oregon missed its goal for the month by \$16,000.

"If Oregon is to continue to set the pace nationally in war bond sales, it will be necessary this month for every family to again measure its war bond responsibilities," declares a statement from Sammons. He urges that each family take counsel, considering first, their total income; second, their total expenses, and then determining the sum that can be regularly invested in war bonds until the war is won.

Also being emphasized in August is the completion of stamp books started during the Shangri-la and Molly Pitcher campaigns. Stamps draw no interest until they have been converted into bonds.
