### ARMY ORDNANCE READY FOR BIG BATTLE ADVANCE

It is now possible to reveal the magnitude of Army Ordnance operations in North Africa because they are now regarded as mere curtain-raisers.

The Tunisian campaign and the Sicilian invasion provided invaluable experience for the major job ahead. Operations will be on a still larger scale and will require more preparation. But they will bring the war into its final phase.

Last December, according to word received today by Col. A. S. Buyers, commanding the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, one North African depot of the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces, consisted of 50,000 square feet of covered space and 530,000 square feet of open space. In June, 1943, the

total area was 158,000 square feet of covered space and 1,775,000 square feet of open space.

During an average day, this Army Ordnance depot handled anywhere from 200 to 500 calls for battle weapons and ammunition. It issued from 71 to 200 tons of Axis softeners, 13 combat vehicles, 296 tactical vehicles, and six artillery pieces.

In order to facilitate the movement of Ordnance and other supplies, more than 70 locomotives and 400 freight cars were transported from the United States and Britain. North African railroads, with the aid of this additional equipment, brought up to the front lines 45,255 carloads of battle supplies. Thousands of trucks and barges supplemented the railroad service.

During the last 46 days of the Tunisian campaign, 38 million pounds of ammunition were fired by Allied troops. Three hundred types of am-

munition for the ground forces and 220 different kinds for the air forces were necessary.

In preparation for the Sicilian invasion, Army Ordnance troops completely serviced all battle-bruised vehicles in jig time. In one instance, a record total of 4,800 vehicles were repaired, greased and washed in 12 days. Thousands of other vehicles, tanks and artillery pieces were brought to prime condition in an incredibly short time.

These difficult achievements are a sure guarantee that when the all-out assault is finally made on Hitler's European Fortress, weapons and am-

munition, in whatever quantity desired, will be supplied our ground and air forces from North African depots quickly and efficiently.

Army Ordnance is ready for the big push.

### Dessert diary—summer 1943

When hot-weather appetites make light dinners appropriate, reinforce the menu with a hearty dessert—one that will tempt the family into getting its full share of nourishing food. Good desserts can carry plenty of food values, you know, including vitamins, minerals, and energy-producing essentials. Our Diary of Desserts offers foods that are grand finales to lightweight menus.

**OLD-FASHIONED PEACH COBBLER**—Prepare biscuit dough as usual. Roll it out to a thickness of 1/4 inch. Cut strip to fit around the sides of a pan about 2 inches deep. Arrange fresh, sliced peaches, sugared to taste, in pan. Dot with butter. Add 1/4 cup water to create steam. Cover peaches with remaining dough; press edges together and seal; cut large slits in top to allow steam to escape. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 15 minutes, then turn down heat and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes longer.

**FRUITED FLOATING ISLAND**—Place fresh berries or sliced fruits in tall sherbet dishes, cover with icy cold, soft, boiled custard. Top with meringue made by beating egg whites until stiff, then adding powdered sugar and blending. Put a fleck of jelly or jam on top of the meringue and chill.

**FRUIT BETTY**—Combine 1 1/2 cups moist breadcrumbs with 1/4 cup sugar and 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon. Place alternate layers of fresh fruit and breadcrumbs in casserole, beginning with fruit and ending with breadcrumbs. Dot with butter or other shortening, add 1/2 cup of fruit juice or water, cover casserole and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) for 45 minutes. Serve with light cream or thin custard sauce.
