**ORDNANCE CORPS WINS HONORS IN BATTLE AREAS**

A fighting Ordnance regiment, organized as the first complete regiment of its kind in the Army, achieved new distinction in the Mediterranean area, according to word received today by Colonel A. S. Buyers, Commanding Officer of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

This regiment, subsequently broken down into battalions, companies, and sections, rendered valiant, capable service in distributing and maintaining guns, tanks and ammunition in war theatres, including the Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns.

Composed of expert mechanics, technicians and executives from 22 Western states, this Ordnance regiment was established in record-breaking time. It is one of the largest, most talented and best trained regiments our Army has ever had. About 60 per cent of the men are married. Their average age is 10 years above the Army draft age average. They rate highest I. Q. (Intelligence Quotient) average of any regiment in the Army.

Between 85 and 90 per cent of the members of this unit—which is so large that it can service several armies at the same time—were engaged in the peace-time automobile industry and other trades relating to it. Now, as volunteer soldiers, these experts are performing one of the most essential services of modern warfare in designing, distributing, maintaining, repairing and salvaging all kinds of mechanical, automotive and other types of Ordnance equipment on the field of battle.

Members of this fighting Ordnance regiment went through tough basic military training that made them into hardened soldiers. They were then sent to Ordnance training centers and manufacturing plants throughout the nation for further special training and study.

This regiment, which broke all Army precedent in the manner of organization, recruiting and training, was created when executives of the National Automobile Dealers Association inquired in Washington how their organization could serve best in the war effort. The Association carried out its own enlistment program, converting its members' garages into recruiting stations. Besides this first unit, recruited in the Western states, the Association later recruited and trained other Ordnance regiments from the Eastern states.

**DOE DEER TAGS STILL AVAILABLE**

Tags are still available for doe deer in the Steens Mountain, Lake-Klamath and Hart Mountain refuge areas but applications are coming in rapidly from hunters and it is expected most of the tags will be sold by the opening of the hunting season on October 1. A person may now apply for doe deer tags in one or more areas but not for more than one tag in any one particular area. The resident fee is \$3.50 for each doe deer tag.

Antelope tags also are still on sale at \$2.50 each for residents. Open season is from September 18 to October 3.

In order to apply for the special tags a person should forward to the Oregon State Game Commission, 616 Oregon Building, Portland 4, Oregon, the requisite fee together with information as to the number and kind of hunting license held.

No more applications are being considered for Grant county doe deer tags, Hart Mountain buck deer tags or northeastern Oregon cow elk tags, for which drawings were held on August 19. The game department is notifying applicants as to the results of the drawings by mailing each applicant either a tag or a refund check. Due to the large number of applications, it will take two or three weeks before everyone can be notified.

License agents are now supplied with maps showing the special hunting areas and also will soon have a supply of the 1943 hunting synopsis.
