INCOME TAX DECLARATIONS DUE SEPT. 15TH

(Continued from Page One)

Persons required to file the declarations are generally: 1. The recipients this year or last year of gross incomes from wages subject to withholding in excess of \$2,700 for single persons or \$3,500 for married couples; 2. Those who have incomes this year, or had incomes last year, requiring the filing of a return, with more than \$100 of these incomes derived from sources other than wages subject to withholding; 3. Those required to file an income tax return on 1942 incomes and whose wages subject to withholding for 1943 are reasonably expected to be less than their similar wages for 1942.

Where the declarations show an estimated tax liability for 1943 in excess of credits, half of the excess is to be sent to the Collector of Internal Revenue along with the declaration, and the other half remitted on or before December 15. Credits to be taken on the declaration include withholdings and the payments, if any, made to Collectors on March 15 and June 15 this year on account of 1942 income taxes. The withholdings to be credited include those, if any, made by employers of the Victory Tax for the

first half of the year, before the new withholding system went into effect, plus those made since July 1 under the new system.

Treasury statisticians have calculated that about 15,000,000 persons with tax liability for 1943 will be required to file the declaration.

Many of the people who must file declarations will be professional workers, such as lawyers and doctors. Many more will be persons operating their own business establishments. Another large class of people who must file the declaration are those with earnings on which there is a liability reaching into the upper surtax brackets, and therefore not fully covered by withholding. There will be many also from persons with combination incomes such as wages, on which taxes are withheld, plus interest, dividends or rents, to which withholding does not apply.

If correction of the September 15 estimate of any taxpayer becomes necessary, an amended declaration may be filed on or before December 15, and the proper adjustment in payments made.

Declarations are to be sent by September 15 to the Collector of Internal Revenue in whose district the taxpayer expects to file his final income tax return for 1943 next year.

In the case of taxpayers deriving 80 percent or more of their gross income from farming, filing of declarations is not required until December

15, at which time the full unpaid balance of the estimated tax must be paid. They may, however, file on September 15 if they wish and pay their estimated tax in two installments—September 15 and December 15.

The Current Tax Payment Act provides a penalty for a substantial under-estimate of the tax due. However, it was pointed out by the Treasury, no one who makes his estimate carefully need incur this penalty. The privilege of filing an amended declaration on or before December 15 is a safeguard on this score.

Eventually, operation of the withholding system plus the declaration system will make all individual income taxpayers substantially current. That is to say, each individual income taxpayer will pay his taxes during the year in which the income is received. Under the old income tax law, payment of an individual's tax for any given year's income was delayed to the year following.

GEO. ATTEBURY TO HAVE RODEO ON LABOR DAY

What will probably be the last entertainment of its kind for this season will be staged at the George Attebury ranch a mile southeast of Stanfield Sunday and Monday, September 5 and 6, a two-day rodeo. Earlier shows have proven popular and a large crowd is expected to be present Sunday and Monday, which is Labor Day. Among the featured acts will be bucking, calf roping, maverick races, novelty races and other events. The highlight of the two day rodeo will probably be a new bucking horse, Hart Mountain, recently obtained by Mr.

Attebury. He has never been ridden—and probably won't be for some time. Also present will be Corpus Christi and Too Bad Al, two very well-known bucking broncs. A special prize will go to the cowboy riding Hart Mountain.

A side-issue event which is causing considerable mention is a private "cowboy" feud between Sam Nye of Hermiston and Clyde Kenison of Stanfield. They have agreed to settle the issue by seeing who can make the best ride on a Brahma bull.

Lloyd Russel and Clyde Kenison will entertain the Traildusters prior to the rodeo and will go directly to the Kenison farm. Following a short rest period, the men will serve a lunch to members of the Traildusters riding club. Following the lunch, the group will ride to the Attebury rodeo.

RATIONING CALENDAR

RATION BOOK NO. 2

October 2—Expiration date of red stamps X, Y and Z, last of the red stamps series in War Ration Book 2. X becomes valid August 22: Y on August 29, and Z on September 5.

September 20—Expiration date of blue stamps R, S and T (processed foods). Blue stamps U, V and W, valid September 1, through October 20.

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) Replacement book containing coupons to be used as those in ration book 2 run out.

October 2—Expiration date of brown stamps A and B. October 30—Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F. A becomes valid September 12; B on September 19; C on September 26; D on October 3; E on October 10; and F on October 17.

RATION BOOK NO. 1

Sugar. October 31—Expiration date stamp No. 14, five pounds. Canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds, through October 31.

Shoes. October 31—Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes.

STOVES

August 24—Rationing of cooking and heating stoves began. Includes most new stoves burning coal, wood, oil or gas for domestic use. Purchasers must get certificates from ration boards.

FUEL OIL

September 30—Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations valid through January 3, 1944. One unit, period 5 coupons valid through September 30 for 10 gallons. Ten unit, period 5 coupons, valid through September 30 for 100 gallons. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

GASOLINE

September 21—Expiration date of No. 7 stamp in A book, each good for 4 gallons.

September 1—Old type B and C

gasoline coupons became invalid. May be exchanged by mail or in person at ration boards for new type coupons.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspections every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

Laborless Labor Day

How about a laborless Labor Day for you, the Homemaker? Truly you deserve relaxation along with the rest of the family! And it can be done, you know.

To make sure the day will be free from cooking, plan your menus for the entire week end so that practically all the meals can be cooked Saturday. Holiday meals needn't follow the regular schedule. With breakfast later in the morning and heartier, too, and a substantial dinner in the evening, lunch can be merely a snack or left out entirely. Of course dinner should be plentiful enough to take care of robust appetites, so we recommend the following:

LABOR DAY DINNER

Old-fashioned Baked Beans
Hot Spiced Beets
Cabbage, Carrot and Orange Slaw
Whole Wheat or Boston Brown Bread
Butter or Margarine
Applesauce Shortcake
Beverage

Ahead-of-time cooking—The beans, beets and shortcake can all be prepared ahead of time so that most of the work is done. Just reheat the beans for an hour before serving time. The beets can be cooked for Saturday with enough left over to spice and reheat for Monday. The shortcake and applesauce can easily be prepared earlier and united at the last moment.

Baked beans can be different—Practically everyone has her special way of baking beans. My favorite method is to put an onion in the bottom of the bean pot, then heap in the boiled beans, add sweetening, seasonings and enough bean liquor for moisture, and bake. The onion flavor permeates each and every bean in a most delicious manner.
