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Major General (known better to us as Colonel) Thomas M. In 1937 he expected the government to give orders to commence work. Later he was promoted to eastern work, and now is in position to say much about river work and the post war public program.

DIVISION OF LAND FOR NEEDED CROPS IS PROBLEM

How much land can be spared for what has become a question of importance in Oregon's wartime food production program. The question is presented concisely in a review of the outlook for planting fall sown crops just issued by the Oregon Agricultural Extension service.

Unlike a year ago, soil moisture conditions are now generally favorable for fall seeding operations in Oregon and there is demand for a greater acreage of fall sown crops. On the other hand, if too much of the limited amount of land available should be planted to fall sown crops this month and next, too little will be available for planting other annual crops next spring that may be even more important in the food program. The review shows.

Oregon's principal fall sown crops are winter wheat, oats, and rye; vetch and peas for seed; vetch, peas and grains for hay; and common ryegrass for seed. Of the land available for crop production in the whole of Oregon, about two-fifths is usually planted to fall sown annual crops. About one-fifth is usually used for spring sown annual crops. The other two-fifths is usually used for perennial crops, summer fallow, etc.

The principal spring sown annual crops are spring wheat and oats, barley, corn, potatoes, vegetables for the fresh market and for processing, dry peas and beans for food, sugar beets, and flax for seed or fiber.

The extension service report, which is available from county agriculture agents, also contains a review of the current farm prices and cost situation. Advances in farm prices for chickens and eggs, grain, hay and some other items more than offset declines in most fruits and vegetables, meat animals, etc., causing the general farm price index to advance from mid-July to mid-August.

The Oregon general farm price index at 196 per cent of the 1935-1939 average was two points higher than at mid-July and 36 points above August 1942.

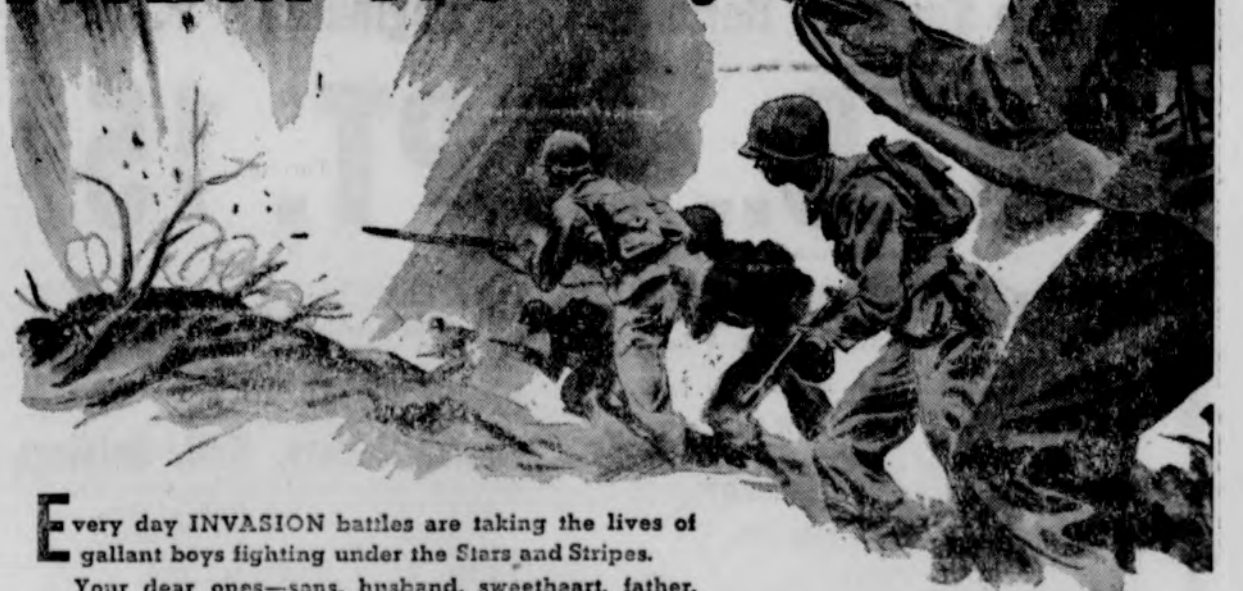
