UMATILLA DAM TO BE STRESSED

A \$100,000,000 postwar development program for the Pacific northwest is planned by army engineers, according to an announcement from Portland released this week. Included are the Umatilla dam on the Columbia river, three dams between Umatilla and Bonneville, several Snake river dams and the Willamette valley flood control project in Oregon, according to Maj. Gen. Thomas M. Roberts.

The builder of Bonneville dam and chief of the army engineers' construction

division said the Umatilla dam would improve navigation on the Snake river, in addition to increasing power output.

"If it hadn't been for Bonneville," he said, "you wouldn't have all this war production that is going on around here now."

NOBELS NOW ON FORD ACREAGE

A recent land transaction transferred 285 acres from Roy and John Ford to Clyde Nobleman of Wallowa county. The deal was one of the largest cash transactions made in this area for some time, \$14,000.00 in cash money. Mr. Nobleman formerly operated a large cattle ranch in the Wallowa mountains region.

Since the date of the sale, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ford have purchased the Florence Davis place and Mr. and Mrs. John Ford have purchased the H. M. Kowitz place. Both the latter farms are of smaller dimensions located just south of Hermiston.

TIME AT HAND FOR PACKAGES TO SOLDIERS

The Christmas shopping season is here—even though the weather is still warm. Mailing of gifts for Army and Navy personnel overseas must begin by September 15 if many of the men and women in the armed forces are not to be disappointed. Christmas gifts may be mailed by parcel post to soldiers only between September 15 and October 15. Due to long distances, shortage of space and other difficulties, the early date is very essential.

Rules, as announced by the postal department, follow:

The parcel must not exceed five pounds, and must not be more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. It should be marked "Christmas parcel" so that it may be given special attention to assure its arrival before December 25.

Not more than one parcel may be mailed in any one week to the same member of the armed forces by or in behalf of the same mailer.

The parcel must be well and strongly packed, in a container of metal, wood, strong fiber board, or similar material, then wrapped in strong paper and tied with twine. The cover should be such that it can be opened readily for censorship. The contents should be packed tightly.

Perishable goods, such as fruits that may spoil, are prohibited. Intoxicants, inflammable materials such as matches or lighter fluids, poisons, and anything that may damage other mail are prohibited. Gifts enclosed in glass should be substantially packed

to avoid breakage. Sharp instruments, such as razors and knives, must have their edges and points protected so that they cannot cut through the coverings and injure postal personnel or damage other packages.

Since the armed forces are being plentifully supplied with food and clothing, the Army and Navy recommend against these as gifts.

Addresses must be written clearly and completely. In addition to the return address of the sender, a parcel for an Army man should show the name, rank, Army serial number, branch of service, organization, Army post office number, and name of post office through which the parcel is routed.

The address on a parcel for a Navy man should include the name and rank or rating of the addressee, the Naval unit to which he is assigned and the Navy number assigned thereto, or the name of his ship, and the fleet post office through which the parcel is routed.

Russell H. Piersol, 21, electrician's mate, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Piersol of Hermiston, has completed basic training at the submarine school, Submarine Base, New London, Conn., for duty with our growing fleet of under-seas fighters. He is in Hermiston enjoying a 14-day furlough.

E/M Piersol will be entitled to wear the twin dolphin insignia of the submarine service after further experience aboard a submarine during

which he must demonstrate to his commanding officer that he is fully qualified to carry out the duties of his rate. The insignia is regarded as a mark of distinction throughout the Navy.

Piersol was graduated from Hermiston Union high, lettering in football and tennis there. He studied architectural designing at the University of Oregon, Eugene, also competing in college football. He had ROTC instruction from September 1941 to May of last year and, after entering the naval service in July, had recruit training in San Diego, Calif., and was assigned to duty aboard battleship.

The submarine school, the only one of its kind in the Navy, is attended by a picked group of men who must pass special physical, mental, and psychological tests.
