REV. H. V. MCGEE IS ORDAINED

The Hermiston Baptist church entertained a number of guests Monday afternoon and evening, who assembled to participate in the ordination service for Rev. H. V. McGee.

The ordination Council held its meeting between three and five p. m. Mr. McGee read his thesis on doctrinal beliefs and personal experiences in the Christian religion. Following the reading of this manuscript members of the council questioned the candidate at length until satisfied that he understood the principles of Christianity as outlined by the New Testament. The council cast a unanimous vote to proceed with the ordination.

Dinner was served at 6 p. m. for the visitors, friends and members of

the church. The tables were arranged in a V shape and were tastefully decorated with flowers. A menu of creamed chicken, mashed potatoes, string beans, vegetable salad, apple pie, and coffee was enjoyed by the guests.

COAL RATIONING STARTS MONDAY

wers for dealers and consumers may be obtained at local war price and

rationing boards.

"It was necessary to add coal to the rationing order because of the uncertainty of the coal supply for this area," Day said. "The shortages of fuel oil and wood have placed a heavy burden on coal, necessitating action to protect coal users."

"Multiplied war requirements, both military and industrial; greatly increased population; shortage of manpower at all stages of production and distribution; and the acute transportation problem, both rail and truck, have cut coal supplies in the face of a soaring demand," he said.

The priorities system for coal deliveries was decided upon by the OPA in consultation with the War Production Board, Solid Fuels Administration, Petroleum Administration for War and the Office of Defense Transportation.

Covered by the new ration order are all dealers who sell or deliver 50 or more tons of coal in less than carload lots, or 50 or more cords of firewood.

Coal dealers do not register immediately but all coal dealers must report the firm name and business address at once to local District OPA fuel rationing offices in Seattle, Spokane, or Portland, in order to receive instructional materials. Instructions for complete registration will be issued shortly. Firewood dealers already registered need not register again unless they also handle coal.

Under the new ration order dealers in each community are required to spread available supplies of coal and wood fairly among consumers in the following priority order:

1. Consumers who need coal or firewood for other than heat, domestic

hot water or cooking—that is for industrial, commercial or agricultural purposes to keep operations rolling—may obtain all they need for a full season, but no more.

2. Consumers who need coal or wood for heat, hot water, or domestic cooking (except those who use fuel oil, gas or electricity primarily) and whose fuel on hand, both wood and coal, is less than one-fourth of their annual fuel needs, may buy enough to bring their supply up to one-fourth.

3. Domestic consumers who have one-fourth or more but less than one-half of their annual needs may order up to one-half.

4. Consumers who have one-half or more, but less than full needs, may order up to their needs; and last:

5. Consumers who need coal or firewood but who use fuel oil, gas or electricity primarily, may purchase enough to bring their total supply up to their annual needs.

No consumer may obtain more than his annual needs.

The consumer, in ordering coal or firewood, must give his dealer the following information which will determine his priority rating: the amount of wood and coal on hand and the amount needed for the year. This must be confirmed in writing within seven days after ordering. Domestic consumers are not allowed to order from more than one dealer at a time, and must take delivery when they can get it.

To help coal dealers on transportation and delivery problems, the new ration order permits dealers to make a single delivery of a full load of coal or a portion of a load even though it would bring the consumer's supply to more than his allowable amount, provided it is not more than 1 1/2 tons in excess of the allowable amount.

Local coal users are informed that they must not have orders in to more than one company as this will only complicate matters.

Thoughts on the care and use of meat

I've found buying meat only two or three times a week presents some real problems in how to keep meats at home, and what kinds to buy so they will keep.

I've discovered one simple little formula. When I shop, I buy a quick-cooking meat for use that very evening and a longer-cooking good-keeping variety for the next night or two.

Sometimes, when they're available, I get chops or ground meat to use right away. At the same time, I get lamb or beef ribs for long cooking, and wieners or sausage to keep.

Any meat that I want to keep for a day or two without cooking, like larger pieces of beef, pork, veal or lamb, I handle this way: After unwrapping it, I cover it loosely in wax paper and pop it right into the refrigerator. I've learned that if it's wrapped too tightly, it may spoil.

Some, I know, store meat in the freezing unit of their refrigerator, or else have a special container for meat. I've tried putting meat right in the freezing unit, because it keeps well for a long time there—but I had a terrible time getting it out again unless I defrosted the refrigerator.

I've been preparing meat for our dinners in a variety of ways, recently. Here are some of the ideas I have found specially good.

Oven Barbecued Ribs—Use breast of lamb or pork spare ribs allowing about a half pound per person. Place whole or half rack of ribs in pan, meat-side up, and cook it about one hour in a 400° F. oven or until brown and done. Turn when halfway through cooking and season with salt and pepper.

KIDNEY SAUTE—Allow 2 lamb kidneys per person. Wash and slice thinly, flour heavily; saute in bacon drippings or other shortening until brown. Add water to cover; season to taste with salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Cook until tender over low heat, about 20 minutes. Serve over hot toast, biscuits, rice or noodles.
