**RENT CONTROL OFFICE MOVED IN PENDLETON**

An important change will take place in rent control in Umatilla county on October 1. On this date the Umatilla county office will be moved to the Pendleton Ration Board in the Junior High school building. Examinations and inspections will be made by Mr. Lowery of Walla Walla who will cover Walla Walla and Pasco as well as Umatilla county.

Orders and supervisory action will issue from the OPA District office in Spokane.

The OPA has consolidated all of the offices in the areas of smaller population on the Pacific coast. Area offices in Pendleton, Walla Walla, Pasco, Coeur d'Alene, Everett, Bellingham, Port Angeles, Astoria, Corvallis and Medford will all be moved to ration boards with a substantial decrease in personnel.

Raley Peterson, area rent director, stated that Umatilla county has had one of the finest records on the Pacific coast in regard to rent control. In the year's operation but one eviction action has been filed in court. He thanked the public for its cooperation and he asks that cooperation continue under the new plan of operation.

**MANY ATTEND U.S.O. PAGEANT SUNDAY; AUCTION SELLS BONDS**

**MRS. DE MOSS IS DRAMA AUTHOR**

A large crowd, estimated at around 1200, witnessed the U.S.O. pageant, "Wagon Wheels", Sunday afternoon at the Hermiston fairgrounds. The story of the pageant, written by Mrs. Catherine DeMoss of Hermiston, carried the spectators back to the year 1805, and by successive scenes brought them back to the present, including Umatilla Ordnance Depot and the war. The drama, read over the loud-speaker by Miss Mary Lou Johnson of the U. S. O., was portrayed by a cast of over 100 players, including a large group of Indians from the Umatilla, Cayuse and Walla Walla tribes.

A lengthy parade preceded the pageant with approximately 200 people participating. Participants included a police car, Pendleton air base band, army truck, Oregon Women's Ambulance Corps, Indians in costume, Trail Dusters, Hermiston Carpenters Local 933, and other features.

Following the pageant, several bonds were given away to holders of proper tickets. Mrs. Minnie Lutz of Pendleton won the American Legion \$1000 bond and Walter Hamm won the \$50 U.S.O. bond. The carpenters local bond still awaits a claimant. The ticket number is 404. At the bond auction, sponsored by Hermiston Carpenters Local 933, a total of almost \$10,000 in bonds was sold. The total for the day, including the gift bonds, \$3000 in bonds sold by the American Legion Auxiliary, the auction and individual purchases, was slightly over \$15,000 in bonds for the day.
