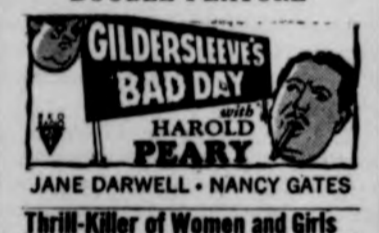

## BULLDOGS WIN FROM PASCO 8-6

(From the Bulldog)  
The Hermiston High Bulldogs won their second football game of the year Friday night at Pasco in a game that was packed with thrills all of the way. It was a case of Hermiston threatening all of the first half and then being forced to play defense all of the way to protect their lead.

The game started with Hermiston kicking to Pasco. The Pasco team failed to gain and on fourth down they kicked. Hermiston immediately began a drive which ended on about the Pasco 20. On their second play in this new series of downs, the ball got past the Pasco backfield and into the end zone. Only quick action by Carey, Pasco back, kept Hermiston from scoring a touchdown. He was tackled in the end zone, however, for a Hermiston safety. This gave Hermiston the two points which eventually proved to be the margin of victory. The score read Hermiston 2 and Pasco 0 at the end of the first quarter.

Hermiston's scoring punch went to work at the beginning of the second quarter. The Hermiston team was constantly in Pasco territory. Two passes: one from Davis to Belt and one from Davis to Rodgers, fell incomplete in the Pasco end zone when they were batted down by the Pasco backfield. Finally, with about five minutes left in the quarter, a pass from Davis to Jack Rodgers was completed in the end zone for a touchdown. Try for the extra point failed and Hermiston led 8 to 0 at the half-way mark.

Hermiston again kicked off to open four plays later and from the same play, Carey again raced about 30 yards to the Hermiston three yard stripe. After three fruitless shots at

the second half and it was immediately plain that Pasco was out for the points. With Carey doing most of the ball packing, the Pasco boys were always on the move. On the other hand, Hermiston could not seem to get anybody in the clear long enough to do much damage. In spite of this the third quarter was about even. At the end of the third period the score was still Hermiston 8 and Pasco 0.

The final quarter showed that Pasco had finally found its scoring punch and was going to be tough from there on. Using a tricky offense featuring a reverse play with a lateral after a forward pass, Carey broke away for a 40 yard romp into touchdown territory which was called back because of a Pasco off-side penalty. About the Hermiston line the Pasco fullback, Perry, drove across for the score. The try for point was blocked. This left about a minute to go and the contest ended Hermiston Bulldogs 8 and the Pasco Bulldogs 6.

Special credit again goes to the entire Hermiston backfield, and especially to Gale Davis and Jack Rodgers. It was a Davis-to-Rodgers pass that gave Hermiston the ball game. This time we won't attempt to pick a star in the line where about nine boys played fine ball.

Let's also give credit to a fine group of boys, the Pasco team, who put everything they had into the contest and who, win, lose or draw, will always be good sports about it.
