RATION BOOK 4 GOOD ON NOV. 1

War Ration Book Four is designed to last over a period of nearly two years. It contains eight pages with 48 individual stamps to a page.

To insure adequate use of War Ration Book 4, applicants must make their applications prior to October 30, since the green stamps series A, B, and C will become valid November 1, 1943, for the purchase of canned, bottled, frozen fruits, vegetables, juices and dried fruits and all canned soups.

This does not mean that War Ration Book 2 expires at the time stamps in Book 4 become valid. The X, Y, and Z Blue Stamps in War Ration Book 2 remain valid until November 20, 1943, which means that stamps in both Book 4 and Book 2 will be valid from November 1 to November 20th.

Green stamps in War Ration Book 4 will be used in exactly the same manner as the Blue stamps in War Ration Book Two. Stamps A, B and C will become valid November 1st and will remain valid until December 20.

In addition to the Green stamps in War Ration Book 4 which will be used for processed foods as explained above and Sugar stamp number 29 becomes valid on November 1. It can be used for the purchase of 5 lbs. of sugar. It remains valid until January 15, 1944. Sugar stamp number 29 is on the bottom right hand corner of the last page of stamps.

UMATILLA DAM URGED AS FIRST RIVER PROJECT

Army engineers and house members from Oregon and Idaho urged the rivers and harbors committee last Friday to approve for construction after the war a series of dams and power developments on the Columbia and Snake rivers in Washington, Oregon and Idaho to cost approximately \$80,000,000.

Col. Peter A. Feringa, representing the engineers, recommended construction of the Umatilla dam on the Columbia river as the first step in the development of the rivers. It would cost approximately \$50,000,000 with means of developing power and \$23,700,000 without power. He also recommended construction of four dams on the Snake river at a cost of \$30,000,000.

Representative White (D-Idaho), Angell (R-Ore.) and Stockman (R-Ore.) urged the committee to approve the plan. The Oregon representatives joined White in urging approval of the Snake river dams in Idaho to carry navigation to Lewiston, Idaho, and open to water transportation a huge inland territory now without transportation.

White told the committee the development would make possible the

shipment of minerals, lumber, grain and other commodities to tidewater.

He said construction of the dams on the two rivers would create additional power of approximately a billion kilowatt hours a year and that the two rivers had the greatest potential power of any rivers in the nation.

Stockman declared that people of Oregon were unanimous in wanting the Umatilla dam and those on the Snake river constructed.

Angell said that the development proposed by the engineers would open up a new empire which would produce wealth for the entire nation.
