(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)

December 20—Expiration date of green stamps A, B and S.

SUGAR
January 15, 1944—Expiration date of stamp 29, Book Four, good for 5 pounds.

SHOES
Stamp No. 18, Book One, valid for one pair for indefinite period. "Airplane" stamp No. 1, Book Three, valid for one pair for indefinite period.

STOVES
Purchase certificates available at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL
Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations last through January 3, 1944.

Coupons with gallonage printed on face valid until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

GASOLINE
November 21—Expiration date of No. 8 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons.

TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.
