N. D. Bard is preparing to harvest his experimental plot of two acres of Jerusalem artichokes just east of the highway in Echo. This will be part of a shipment of three carloads of the tubers to be shipped from Stanfield soon. Growers receive \$32.50 a ton F.O.B. cars at Stanfield whence the artichokes are shipped to a New York buyer who makes a variety of products from them, ranging from edible chips to plastics. The tops, which are about six feet tall, are cut before the tubers are dug and make excellent stock feed. One grower has 17 acres of artichokes near Stanfield which he plans to leave in the ground for his hogs to harvest. As this crop produces a large yield and is free from insect pests a much larger acreage is expected in the district next year.

Mrs. Ed Acton has received a card from her son Pvt. Earl K. Acton, who is a prisoner of war of the Japanese. Acton was in service at Corregidor from the start of the war and when Ft. Mills was surrendered was confined by the Japs in Philippine Military Camp No. 10B. The card is printed in English with a series of alternative statements concerning the prisoner so that all he does is underline the words that apply. It says: Health is good, not under treatment, am well, hope you are well, give my regards to all the family, and is signed by Earl. The first direct message from Earl after his capture was a similar card received here August 14.

A letter from Steve Spike says he is still at the Ft. Douglas reception center, Salt Lake City. He has passed an examination in the army postal service and may be assigned to that work later.
