**CITY OFFICIALS ARE INVITED TO REGIONAL MEET**

Mayor F. C. McKenzie, members of the city council, and other officials of Hermiston have been invited by Mayor Sprague H. Carter of Pendleton and Mayor John Houston of Klamath Falls to attend a regional meeting of the League of Oregon Cities to be held in Pendleton on Tuesday evening, November 16. Mayor Houston is president of the League. Mayor McKenzie has been asked to organize a delegation including school and civic leaders to attend the meeting.

The development of policies and specific community programs designed to meet postwar conditions will be one of the primary objectives of the cities' regional meetings this year. Public works programming, juvenile delinquency, housing and other war and postwar problems are scheduled for consideration.

Meeting with representatives from this area will be Fred C. Inkster, League vice president; George K. Aiken, state budget director and secretary of the Governor's committee on Postwar Readjustment and Development; Oscar Cutler, assistant staff engineer, State Highway Commission; Orval Etter, legal consultant for the League; and Herman Kehrl, League executive secretary and director of the University's Bureau of Municipal Research and Service. Local arrangements are being handled by Mayor Sprague H. Carter and City Recorder Charles H. Burnett of Pendleton.

"Every community faces the possibility of a municipal 'Pearl Harbor' when peace comes," said Mayor Houston in calling the regional meetings. Mayor Houston has just returned from a nation-wide conference of city officials and league representatives in Chicago. "We have been doing a lot of talking about postwar planning but have not taken enough action. Each community will be faced with the dilemma of continuing the high salaries and plentiful job situation of the war economy on through the peace economy."

Recommending immediate organization of planning groups in each community and the appointment of city budget committees by January 1 so that long-range programs can be included in the 1944-45 city budgets. Mayor Houston states, "I believe the most successful solution of the postwar shock, which will be faced by every town in the state, can best be

solved by a unified organization of the city, county, school, and civic groups. In order to do this job well, it will require the complete cooperation of every citizen in each community and of the groups that represent them."

**For Cranberry Jam**

8 cups cranberries  
6 cups sugar  
1 cup water

Mash Cranberries lightly; add water and cook until soft. Put through strainer; add sugar and cook 8 minutes, stirring often. Pour into sterilized Kerr jars and seal while hot.

**For Cranberry Jelly**

1 quart cranberries  
1 cup water  
2 cups sugar

Cook berries with sugar until soft; strain juice in sieve. Add sugar to juice and boil rapidly to jelly stage. Pour into sterilized glasses or jars.
