Mass will be celebrated at the community hall at Ordinance on Sunday, November 21 at 11:15 a. m.; on the following Sunday Mass at Ordinance will be at 8:00 a. m., and so on, with Mass alternating on each Sunday at the hours of 11:15 and 8 a. m. On each fourth Sunday, however, Mass at Ordinance will be celebrated at 7:30, so that the people at Pilot Rock may have the opportunity of having an early Mass.

be presented at the election meetings in 225 communities throughout the state. Distribution and rationing programs for machinery and farm supplies will be explained, and farmers will be asked to express their opinions on the goals.

Instead of setting uniform dates for the election meetings throughout the state, the state AAA committee is letting county committees determine when the meetings will be held in each county. In this way, Shepherd explained, the elections can be held in connection with other meetings and arranged in accordance with local conditions.

To cut down on travel, several county committees are planning to put the new dairy feed payment program into operation at the election meetings. The program will be explained and applications for October payments taken following the election, Shepherd said.

Urging farmers to attend the meeting in their community, Shepherd pointed out that every farmer or rancher who has taken part in any program administered by the Agricultural Adjustment agency during the past year is a member of the county agricultural conservation association and may vote in the local elections.

This list will help you plan your "best ever" Thanksgiving

Julia says—  
Celebrate Thanksgiving Thriftily



It seems to me we have a great deal to be thankful for, this Thanksgiving season. Here on the home front we're all working hard to bring Victory closer, and we have the deep satisfaction of seeing that work beginning to bear fruit. It's quite proper and fitting that we should observe the hallowed occasion of Thanksgiving Day by preparing something out of the ordinary for a special meal.

But we need not be extravagant. There are dozens of little tricks that will turn an otherwise ordinary dinner into something very like a feast.

no matter what your "main dish" may be, these suggestions will help to pull your Thanksgiving dinner into the realm of a celebration:

"Carrotatoes"

Ever try this method of using potatoes, for instance? You cook and mash potatoes in the regular way. Then you take as much mashed carrots or rutabagas (also cooked and mashed in the regular way). Combine the two, and you have something attractive in color and pleasantly exciting in flavor.

And here is my recipe for a favorite Thanksgiving pudding:

**THANKSGIVING CARROT PUDDING**

Sift 1 1/4 cups enriched flour; measure; sift again with 1 tsp. soda, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, and 1/2 tsp. cloves. Cream 1/2 cup shortening with 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed; add 2 eggs and beat well. Dredge 1 cup grated, raw carrots, 1 cup grated, raw potatoes, 1 cup raisins, 1/2 cup finely chopped candied lemon peel (optional), and 1 cup finely chopped walnut meats in 1/2 cup of the flour mixture, and beat well; add fruit-nut mixture. Fill well-greased 1 1/2 qt. mold 2/3 full; cover tightly. Steam 3 hours or until done. Serve with lemon or hard sauce. Serves 10 to 12.
