**LICENSE PLATES  
NOW AVAILABLE**

Windshield stickers validating 1944 registrations for Oregon motor vehicles now are being sent out from the motor vehicle division of the state department, Bob Farrell, secretary of state, announced today. He urged Oregon owners to apply early in order to avoid a last-minute rush this year.

The new stickers may be attached to the vehicle on and after December 15th, Farrell said. He reminded motorists to remove the 1943 sticker when the new one is placed on the windshield. No new plates are being issued this year, the sticker serving to validate the 1942 license plates which must be retained on the vehicle.

Applications for 1944 registrations are being received at the state department at the rate of 2200 a day, but unless more come in during the early part of December, the rush at the end of the year will make it impossible to answer the applications promptly, it was said.

Inadequate help to process applications and the mail rush during the Christmas and New Year holiday period is expected to cause a jam in the registration department at Salem. Ap-

plications caught in this jam probably will be delayed in processing, Farrell stated.

**NEIGHBORHOOD  
LEADERS PRAISED**

High praise for the activities of the thousands of neighborhood leaders throughout Oregon is contained in a new leaflet just issued by the Extension service at Oregon State college on this subject. The leaflet summarizes the work of the neighborhood leaders in six projects assigned to them since the plan was put into effect more than a year ago, and says that the work of these volunteer men and women fully deserves special commendation.

"The record production from Oregon farms is ample evidence that Oregon farmers have responded wholeheartedly to the nation's need for maximum production," the circular states.

The six major jobs assigned to the neighborhood leaders were an educational program on inflation control, assistance with salvage campaigns, spreading information on enrichment of white flour, help with the solution of rural transportation, home food production and conservation, and assistance with the third war bond drive.

**ORDNANCE GIVES  
TIPS FOR WINTER  
CARE OF AUTOS**

Dearer than money itself is the family jalopy these days, for there aren't any more where it came from. So the rules the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces lays down for Army drivers to save its victory fleet from winter wear and damage ought to give every family and every war worker a few tips for making the old car last—and incidentally save motorists a few million dollars.

Should you idle a cold engine. The Ordnance magazine, Army Motors, advises G. I. drivers: "Don't slow idle a cold engine. Many engines can't be warmed up by slow idling, no matter how long they run, especially if the engine isn't covered."

It seems that many thermostats which block circulation of cooling water until the engine is warm allow a little water through even when they are closed, and then if the radiator is stone cold, the engine won't heat up. Idling the engine under such conditions is wasting fuel, inviting water and sludge in the crankcase, and hastening wear.

"If the oil pressure is normal," the Ordnance magazine of preventive maintenance goes on, "it's safe to run the engine under load." It all depends on your particular car—so consult your local garage.

Have your thermostat tested—if you have one. It is supposed to keep the cooling liquids from circulating until the engine is warm, and if it opens too soon, it will overcool the engine.

Cover the radiator. In freezing weather, a partly covered radiator that keeps the engine at normal temperature helps keep cold winds from chilling the engine. Closed hood covers help too.

Clean the crankcase breather and ventilator—if you have one. If these are clogged by dirt, there isn't much chance that air will circulate through the crankcase and evaporate whatever water or gasoline may have seeped into the oil.

Drain the crankcase oil. Oil changes may be necessary more often than usual when engines are run cold and thereby exposed to condensation. If the oil is thin and smells like gasoline, drain it, and drain it hot. Drain the oil filter too.

These are only a part of the ground rules for Army drivers, Col. Buyers of Umatilla Ordnance Depot explains. "When an Army truck has to start it goes, but only because there has been a whole lot of skilled maintenance behind it. We can take no chances, because a battle may depend on it, and we have to rely on its being ready all the time. Condensation is the engine's enemy in the winter time, and the Army is keeping them running in weather that freezes ordinary oil into a slab of concrete."
