RATIONING CALENDAR

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) for purchase of meats, fts, etc.

January 1—Expiration date of brown stamps L, M, N, P and Q. P becomes valid on December 12, and Q on December 19.

January 29—Expiration date of brown stamps R, S, T and U. R series valid December 26, S on January 2, T on January 9, U on January 16. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)

December 20—Expiration date of green stamps A, B, and C.

January 20—Expiration date of green stamps D, E, and F.

SUGAR

January 15—Expiration date of stamp 29, in Book Four, good for 5 pounds.

SHOES

Stamp No. 18, Book One, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, Book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES

Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL

Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL

January 3—Expiration date of period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations.

February 8—Expiration date of period 2 coupons which become valid November 30.

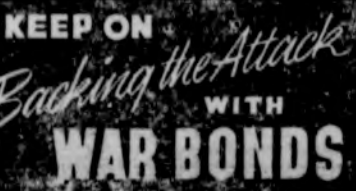
GASOLINE

January 21—Expiration date of No. 9 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons.

Value of gasoline coupons: A, B-1, C-1, 3 gallons; B-2, C-2, R and T, 5 gallons; D, 1.5 gallons; E, 1 gallon.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

During the last semi-month ending November 15, bond deductions fluctuated considerably. Headquarters dropped 14% in participation; Chief clerk's office 20%; Fiscal dropped 30.8%; procurement dropped 33.3%; Plant property 3%; Post Engineer has dropped 30.8%; Stock Control dropped 23.4%; Magazine Area

dropped 4.2%. Those divisions which have raised their participation in the bond deduction program are: Time and payroll, 8.6%; Fire Department, 7.3% or to 100%; Personnel, 8.1 per cent; West Area, 4%; Rail Transportation, 6.7%; Motor Transportation, 1.9%; Inspection, 3.6%; Medical corps 10%. Let's all get our divisions up to the peak in participation for the next pay period.
