**MOTORISTS TOLD  
TO BE CAREFUL**

Traffic accidents during Christmas weeks in Oregon during the last three years have taken a toll of 24 lives. Secretary of State Bob Farrell said today in urging Oregonians to drive and walk more carefully to avoid these tragic holiday deaths.

Suggesting that Oregon "declare a holiday on holiday accidents", Farrell said the majority of the holiday fatalities in this state involve pedestrians struck when they inadvertently placed

themselves in dangerous positions in traffic.

"Inattention to traffic, due to pre-occupation with holiday matters, or to careless haste has resulted in many holiday tragedies during the past few years," he said. "These accidents can be prevented through the exercise of ordinary caution and consideration for the rights of others. Let's declare a holiday on holiday accidents this year."

Farrell listed these suggestions for avoiding holiday hazards:

1. When shopping, don't overload your arms with packages. This prac-

tice restricts vision while crossing streets.

2. Never cross streets between intersections. When in a hurry to reach a certain store, remember the dangers of jaywalking and take time to walk to the nearest intersection.

3. When entering or leaving a parked car, use the door on the curb side, not the door on the street side. Persons attempting to enter their car on the street side with their arms full of packages have been struck by passing cars. Alighting on the street side also has resulted in accidents.

4. When waiting for the light to change at signalized intersections, wait on the curb, not in the street. Cars making right turns constitute a hazard for persons standing a few feet from the curb, especially if those persons are carrying packages and fail to see the approaching car.
