**WOOLGROWERS MEET JAN. 14 - 15**

Thorough discussion of the livestock and meat marketing situation in Oregon and the Pacific northwest and the present prospects for handling the 1944 wool clip are two of the chief subjects scheduled for the forty-eighth annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers association, announced Mac Hoke, Pendleton, president. The convention will be held at The Dalles January 14 and 15, with

committees starting their meetings the afternoon of January 13.

Among program speakers on these subjects will be John J. Madigan of Chicago, in charge of the meat section of the OPA; J. M. Jones, acting secretary of the National Wool Growers association; R. A. Ward, manager of the Pacific Wool Growers cooperative; possibly Lawrence Meyers, in charge of wool for the Commodity Credit corporation in Washington, D. C., and several staff members from O. S. C.

Other program features will deal with textile development, the general economic outlook, and predatory animal control. A program for the women's auxiliary is also being prepared by Mrs. Art Boyd of Baker, president.

**FARM OPERATORS GIVEN WARNING ON MACHINERY**

It is imperative that farm operators continue to make every effort to keep existing machines operating for such new machines as are made from the materials allocated by WPB will in all probability not be available until mid-year 1944, if then, Director E. L. Peterson of the state department of agriculture warns farmers. Peterson says that statements made by farm machinery manufacturer representatives who met recently with state agricultural commissioners, secretaries and directors in St. Louis, indicate that the supply of farm machinery will continue tight through the year 1944. Peterson was present at the meeting.

He reports that from the 900,000 tons of steel for farm machinery production allocated for 1944, repair parts will be manufactured first and what is left will go into new machinery. Moreover, bright parts, cam shafts, valves, bearings, crank shafts and similar parts requiring critical materials will be very short.

"Early reports, it now appears, that in 1944 80 per cent of the farm machinery purchased in 1941 would be produced for farmer use, are no more than a pleasant myth which translates into unhappy reality", the agriculture director asserted.

**CHECK LIST FOR PARTS IS READY**

A handy aid for farmers to use in checking and listing needed repair parts for their principal farm machines has just been issued by the Extension service at O. S. C. for free distribution through all county offices.

This is a printed folder on durable cardboard with space for listing needed repairs for the tractor, plow, combine or binder, disk harrow, mower, and grain drill, as well as blank forms for four additional machines.

The agricultural engineering department is stressing the need of early checking, which includes careful inspection of each machine, a complete listing of parts needed, and early ordering of these parts. Most of the machinery now in use must last for the duration, hence the need for careful attention to repairs.

**January Home Extension Program**

The Home Extension program during the month of January will feature a foods demonstration on "Wartime Cookery," announces Myrtle Carter, Home Demonstration Agent. This will be brought by the project leaders trained by the Extension Service on timely food preparation problems. The first of three district 'slip cover' schools will be held in Adams district, January 12-15. These will be four

day schools, each limited to 16 women, who will slip cover 8 chairs under the supervision of the extension service.

**GLASS UTENSILS NEED EXTRA CARE**

Christmas brought gifts of glass cooking utensils to many homemakers, says Myrtle Carter, Home Demonstration Agent. Be sure that you know if your glass cooking ware is simply 'heat proof' and intended for use in the oven, or 'flame proof' so it can be used on top of the stove and directly over a burner.

Mrs. Carter advises that one always read the label on any piece of glass cooking ware and make sure it is tempered to stand the heat of a direct flame. As an added precaution, never put a glass sauce-pan on the top of a stove empty. Always put a little liquid or fat or moist food in it.

Then avoid sudden changes of temperature. If food is very cold, put it into a cold dish. If the food is hot, warm the glassware before the hot ingredients are added. Don't set a dish of hot food in a glass cooking utensil where a cold draft will blow on it for it might break.

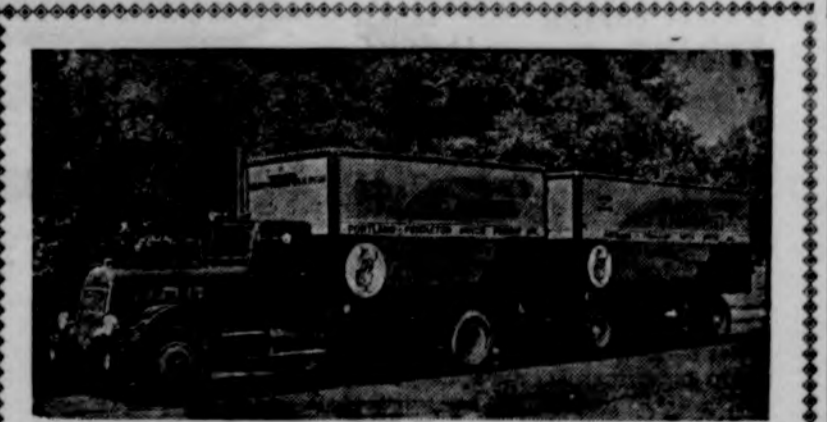
