NAVAL AVIATION CADET QUOTA IS INCREASED

A five-fold boost in quotas for naval aviation cadets has increased opportunities for many more young men to obtain the U. S. Navy's famed \$27,000 aviation education, today reported the Portland Branch, Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 330 American Bank building, Portland, which handles applications in Oregon.

Naval flight training is now open to 18-year-old high school as well as 17-year-old boys, provided they are currently enrolled in high school in their last semester or are high school graduates. Eighteen-year-olds apply to the U. S. Navy first and if qualified they may volunteer through selective service for induction in V-5, the navy's flight training classification. Seventeen-year-old boys may enlist direct in V-5.

Because the flight training is rated the most thorough and the longest in the world, only boys in good physical condition are eligible.

Boys accepted probably will not be sent to school before four months. Any young man who is not found acceptable does not go into any branch of the navy unless he desires to enlist. Cadets enlisted before they finish high school must graduate before they can go on active duty.

Cadets receive eight months training at a college handling the navy's V-12 program, followed by 15 months flight training. After completing this they are commissioned ensigns in the United States Naval reserve.

Applications may be made in this area by mail or in person to the Port-

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land branch, Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 330 American Bank building, Portland. Boys being given serious consideration will have their travel paid to Portland and home again so that they can be interviewed, given physical examinations and aptitude tests.

Julia tells
 How to bake simple old-fashioned "Goodies"

Now that we're starting out on a new year, it's not a bad idea to look back at some of the simple things our "foremothers" used to bake. Meat pies — apple pandowdies — hearty dishes of that good old-fashioned stripe. (And there are ways to get along with much less shortening than in many a "modern" recipe!)

How long since you've tried making a meat pie with biscuits instead of crust, for example?

Curry Biscuits for Meat Pie
 1 cup enriched flour
 1/2 tps. baking powder
 3/4 tsp. curry powder
 2 tpsps. chilled shortening
 1/4 to 1/2 cup milk
 1/4 tsp. salt

Sift flour, measure, add baking powder, salt and curry powder, and sift again. Add shortening, in small pieces, to flour and cut in until mixture is fine. Add milk, stir until flour is dampened. Knead 15 times on lightly floured board, roll to 3/8-in. thickness. Cut with 1 1/4-in. biscuit cutter and place on hot stew. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 25 mins. or until done.

An interesting variation is to cut the biscuit dough in the shape of doughnuts, which lets the stew bubble up through the inner circles. Sound good? It tastes good!

And for dessert, how my family enjoyed old-fashioned apply pandowdy! (I wasn't at all sorry to see that, because it uses just about one-quarter as much shortening as pie!)

Apple Pandowdy
 5 cups thinly sliced apples
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/8 tsp. salt
 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
 1 1/2 tps. lemon juice
 2 tpsps. water
 1/4 tsp. grated lemon rind

Combine apples, sugar, salt, spices, lemon juice, water and rind. Turn into pan (8 x 8 x 2); cover and bake in hot oven (450° F.) 20 mins. Mix 2 cups standard biscuit dough, adding 1 tps. sugar to flour mixture. Knead gently 8 times, shape and roll into square (8 x 8). Fit dough over apples in pan, cut slits to let steam escape, and return to hot oven (450° F.). Bake 25 mins. or until crust is browned. Serve warm with cream or plain. Makes 8 servings.
