RATIONING CALENDAR

RATION BOOK NO. 3
(Brown stamps for purchase of meats-fats, etc.)
February 26—Expiration date of brown stamps V, W and X. X series valid on February 6.
March 20—Expiration date of brown stamps Y and Z. Y series valid on February 13, Z on February 20. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 4
(Processed foods).
February 20—Expiration date of green stamps G, H and J. Green stamps K, L, M, will be good February 1, until March 20 at their 8, 5, 2 & 1 values. Tokens will be given in change on and after February 27.
February 27—Starting date for use of red and blue ration tokens.

SUGAR
March 21—Expiration date of stamp 30. Book 4, good for 5 pounds. Stamp 40, Book 4, valid for 5 pounds of canning sugar between February 1, 1944, and February 28, 1945 (13 mo.)

SHOES
Stamp No. 18, Book 1, and "Air-plane" stamp No. 1, Book 3, valid for one pair each for indefinite period. Loose stamps not accepted.
