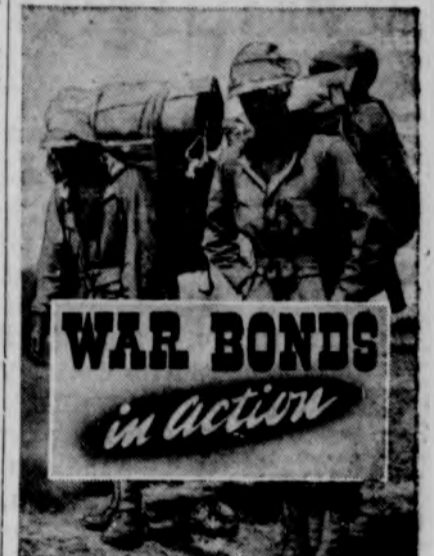
Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Byrnes and Gary Dean Ostrom, and Mrs. Al Vieg spent Friday in Pendleton.
