New Red and Blue Ration Tokens to be Used as "Change" Beginning Feb. 27

(READ AND SAVE FOR FUTURE REFERENCE)

No matter what the value printed on them, nearly all food ration stamps will have a 10-point value beginning February 27th. You'll shop as usual, you'll pay ration stamps as usual, ONLY instead of stamps, you'll receive the new red and blue ration tokens as change. For example, you buy 8 points worth of rationed food. You give a Stone's clerk a 10-point stamp. He gives you 2 red (or blue) ration tokens in change. Here's the new ration schedule, effective February 27th.

BOOK 4—Green Stamps K, L, M may be used for processed foods from Feb. 1 through March 20 — (Value same as present, 8, 5, 2 and 1)

BOOK 4—Blue Stamps A8, B8, C8, D8 and E8 may be used for processed foods Feb. 27 through May 20 — (Value 10 points per stamp)

BOOK 4—Red Stamps A8, B8, C8 may be used for Meats, Fats, Fish, February 27 through May 20 — (Value 10 points per stamp).

BOOK 4—Red Stamps D8, E8, F8 may be used for Meats, Fats, Fish, March 12 through May 20 — (Value 10 points per stamp).

BOOK 3—Brown Stamps Y and Z expire March 20.
