RATION BOOK NO. 3
 (Brown stamps for purchase of meats-fats, etc.)
 February 26—Expiration date of brown stamps V, W and X.
 March 20—Expiration date of brown stamps Y and Z. Z series valid on February 20. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 4
 (Processed foods.)
 February 20—Expiration date of green stamps G, H and J.
 March 20—Expiration date of green stamps K, L, M. Tokens will be given on and after February 27, in change.
 February 27—Starting date for use of red and blue ration tokens.

SUGAR
 March 31 — Expiration date of stamp 30, Book 4, good for 5 pounds. Stamp 40, Book 4, valid for 5 pounds canning sugar through February 28, 1945.

SHOES
 Stamp No. 18, Book 1, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, Book 3, valid for one pair each. Loose stamps not accepted.

STOVES
 Purchase certificates available at local boards.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
 Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL
 March 13—Expiration date of period 3 fuel oil coupons. Period 4 coupons valid February 8 to September 30. Not more than 59 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.

GASOLINE
 March 21—Expiration date of No. 10 coupons in A book, 3 gallons each.
TIRE INSPECTION
 "A" every 6 months, by Mar. 31.
 "B" every 4 months, by Feb. 28.
 "C" every 3 months, by Feb. 28.
 "T" every 6 months or 5,000 miles of driving.
