**ORDNANCE AIDS  
WAR CAMPAIGN  
BY COOPERATION**

Army Ordnance battle experience gained in the Aleutian campaign with the crack Seventh Division was put to good use in the Marshall Islands offensive.

Col. A. S. Buyers, commanding Umatilla Ordnance Depot, cited the fact that Ordnance experts found a stock pile of Jap ammunition on Attu but no gun that could use it. Ordnance officers in New Guinea found a gun but were unable to locate any ammunition for it. Ordnance headquarters in Washington brought ammunition and gun together. Today every combat characteristic of both gun and ammunition is known to Army, Navy and Marine invasion units.

According to a report from Captain E. I. Creed of Philadelphia, Japs are particularly skilled in throwing up strong defensive positions, constructing deadly pillboxes and foxholes of whatever material is at hand. They are very clever in exploiting natural advantages. On Attu, a heavy fog would descend half way down the mountains. Japs would follow the fog down. They could see the Americans but could not be seen by them. Japs are today exploiting jungle and atoll conditions to the maximum extent.

But the weak point of Jap warfare lies in offensive tactics. On Massacre Bay, for example, an American company barber was charged by five howling Japs, including one officer wielding a heavy Samauri sword. The barber emptied an Ordnance carbine into the Japs, firing from the hip and killing them all. This same Jap offensive weakness is being exploited today in the Southwest Pacific, for our troops are now familiar with the tricks and combat qualities of the treacherous enemy.

ward that end. The Stage Gulch spillway had been allowed to fill with silt to a point where it was unusable. Our first effort has been to work over this spillway so as not only protect the canal from recurrent floods from Stage Gulch but also to give us a way of diverting some of this Stanfield waste water from the canal during the summer months with the hope of drying that section of the canal so it can be cleaned early in the fall. Parts of the canal that were free of water have been cleaned to near their original condition. There is much more to be done but water must be run whenever it is available.

As added insurance it is planned to reopen the Maxwell auxiliary line so that we can run more water from the river during April and May, in order to gain some needed time for filling the reservoir with the feed canal. With this end in view the undermined spillways at the head of the Maxwell canal have been worked over and repaired. The canal has been reopened from the head of the M pipe line to the D line and it is proposed to clean the canal to the head before the coming irrigation season. This will enhance the value of the interchange between the M and R pipe lines so that either may be used in case of damage to the other and is also added insurance in case of trouble on the A line.

These are the major efforts for the present, although much work must be done on distribution lines and many pipe lines to insure prompt and adequate delivery to the farms of the area.

The growth of willows and trees along the lined canals is quite an aggravation, as the roots are breaking up the lining. We have therefore a considerable fight to wage to keep this growth down and controlled. Several pipe lines have served their time and need rebuilding. Many of these

have been ruined by willows and locust trees whose roots disintegrate and clog the lines. We plan to re-lay about 900 feet of the K line with concrete pipe to replace worn out wood pipe. Other lines will be repaired as facilities and money will permit.

While the prospects for spring and summer flow in the Umatilla river are not very favorable at present, we hope the next two months will improve these conditions and in any case we feel sure the Cold Springs Reservoir will be filled if not by April 1st, shortly thereafter.

It would be desirable to increase our farm production of war requirements as much as possible during the year, and while we may have to make better use of our available water supply than usual, there is little danger that the area will not be adequately served during the season.

It should be impressed upon the farmers of the district that the district belongs to them, and much of its success depends on their individual effort and cooperation. It is evident that no spectacular or startling improvement can be made but by consistent and constant work the district can be rehabilitated, and its financial condition not too greatly impaired. It will take time and careful planning by all concerned.
