4-H MOBILIZATION WEEK TO BE HELD

4-H Mobilization week will be observed nationally from Saturday, March 4, to Sunday, March 12, by more than 1,700,000 club members in the United States. County 4-H local leaders plan to observe the week through special club meetings to emphasize the goals of club work and to complete organization of clubs for 1944.

As the motto of 4-Hers this year is to produce sufficient food to "Feed a Fighter", 4-H members are having the busiest time of their lives producing and conserving food and clothing, assisting in the home, as well as taking an active part in salvage operation, civilian defense, drives of various kinds and other aid-the-war work. Umatilla county girls enrolled in the 1943 food preservation work, canned 5,283 jars of food during last season.

To date 51 Health and Home Economics clubs are organized for 1944, with a membership of 625. This represents an enlargement of the Home Economics work and indications are that other clubs will be organized in the near future. Members are active in Cooking, Sewing, Homemaking, Bachelor Sewing, Health and Food Preservation. Clubs are led by volunteer local leaders who are assisted in leadership by the Extension service of Oregon State college.
