DYNAMITE IS FOUND IN SACK

Considerable excitement prevailed one day this week when workmen on a building on Newport avenue discovered a sack of dynamite sticks buried under a porch. Chief of Police was called immediately and an investigation launched. Upon checking up it was found that the "sticks" were dated 1912 and 1915, indicating that they had been buried since that time.

It is understood that an old warehouse belonging to Col. H. R. Newport once stood at that location and the dynamite probably belonged to that firm. Needless to say, the material was carefully handled and dumped, without ceremony, into the Columbia river.

CERTIFIED POTATO SEED TEST PLOT NOW AT OSC

A certified seed potato test plot has been established on one of the O.S.C. farms near Corvallis, to assist growers of certified seed throughout the state in obtaining earlier information on stock.

Eighty-eight different lots of seed obtained from 10 counties and including nine varieties were planted about the middle of March. As soon as the plants are large enough to show the presence of any virus diseases a thorough examination will be made of each lot and a report will be made to the grower. In the case of most late varieties, at least, it is believed this will be early enough to give growers information before they plant their main crop.

EVERN in war-time, we can turn an Easter meal into a really memorable event. The secret? Just a little feminine ingenuity!

With eggs, for example: why not make Easter breakfast something to remember, with

FROSTED EGGS

- 9 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. white pepper
- 2 tbsps. butter, margarine or shortening
- 6 toast rounds

Beat 6 whole eggs and 3 yolks together lightly; add milk, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt, and 1/4 teaspoon of the pepper; beat well. Cook eggs slowly in melted butter, margarine, or shortening, in frying pan until just set, stirring occasionally. Place in individual casseroles or on top of rounds of buttered toast, arranged on an ungreased baking sheet. Frost with egg whites beaten until stiff but not dry, and seasoned with remaining salt and pepper. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 15 minutes or until whites are a golden brown. May be served with crisp bacon. Serves 6.
