**EARLY SETTLER WRITES LETTER**

The following letter was received by The Herald this week from F. A. Yates of Ukiah, California, an early settler of this project.

"I have been intending to call to

your attention some of the ancient history of the City of Hermiston, but have somewhat neglected it until now. This terrible explosion of last week has brought it more to my mind.

"Forty years ago this month I filed a homestead claim on the quarter section of land in and just south of Hermiston, then known as Maxwell Siding. In January, 1908, I received patent to the claim and shortly after the property was sold to various owners: Knapton, Hanby, Root, Eriksen, Sullivan, Geise, and Campbell on the home place which was the last piece sold. We left Hermiston May 18, 1911.

"I do not have the Copy No. 1, Volume 1, of the Hermiston Herald, but I do have some clippings and a few copies of the Herald of 1908. Our son Vernon was born in our old shack October 12, 1907.

"Reading over some of the items and names mentioned in the 1908 Herald brings one back to the old primitive days, political and water users feuds and quarrels; the difficulties over the two town sites, the location and relocation of some businesses, the site for the school house; the same with the second hotel and many other things.

"The seven years I lived in Hermiston were I think its most exciting and formative years of its existence. I hope many of my former friends are living and well, the age takes its toll of all of us.

I visited in Hermiston in 1917 and again in 1923, but none since then. I do not want to tire you, and thank you for listening to me."

**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES**

"PROBATION After Death" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 23.

The Golden Text was, "The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death" (I Cor. 15:26).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable. But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first-fruits of them that slept" (I Cor. 15:19,20).

**WATER SUPPLY TO AFFECT YIELD OF OREGON HAY LAND**

A probable marked reduction in 1944 hay supplies in many parts of Oregon is one of the most serious aspects of the irrigation water supply outlook, which shows shortages in many sections, according to reports from most of the eight districts forecast meetings held the first week in April.

Heaviest prospective reduction reported to R. A. Work, in charge of snow surveys and irrigation water forecasting for the Soil Conservation service and O. S. C. experiment station, was in northeastern Oregon, where a reduction of 47,000 tons of alfalfa is foreseen in Baker, Union, and Walla counties. Wasco county, on the other hand, expects only a 10 per cent reduction because of poorer late season stream flow, which is a prospect prevailing rather generally throughout the state.

Irrigated lands in the Umatilla-Walla Walla region, however, will for the most part have adequate water supplies from ample reservoir storage. The same holds true in the Ontario region, where fully adequate irrigation supplies will be available, except in the southern part of Malheur county. A 1500-ton drop in alfalfa production is expected in the Jordan valley, and a 6500-ton wild hay decrease for southern Malheur as a whole unless unusually heavy late rainfall occurs.

Partly to offset the probable reduction in hay output, Walter Holt, Umatilla county agent, advocated that more use be made of cannery pea vines, thousands of tons of which are wasted annually.

Soil moisture conditions in the northern tier of counties extending from the Cascades to the Blue mountains were found generally good, partly because of the near record moisture supply of last year, much of which is still retained in the subsoil. This favorable soil moisture condition does not, however, exist in the Grande Ronde valley and some other parts of the three northeastern counties.

A more complete state-wide sum-

mary of conditions will be made by Work at the annual Columbia basin meeting in Portland April 18.
