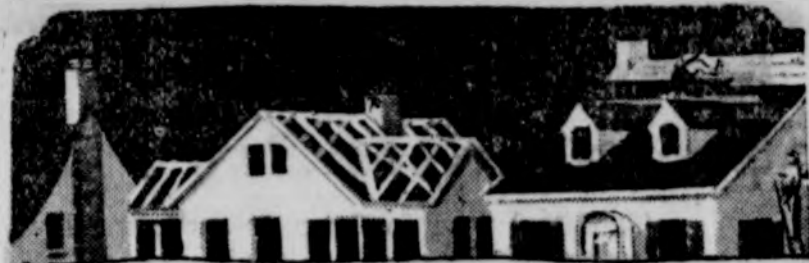

SALE OF TURKEYS LIMITED TO ARMY

Pendleton, Oregon—The War Food Administration, through War Food Order 97 effective April 21, requires 100 per cent set-aside of hen turkeys processed in California, Washington, Oregon and Utah, announced Lewis A. Nichols, area supervisor, Office of Distribution, WFA, Pendleton.

According to Nichols the order limits the sale and purchase to authorized plants who must hold or ship to the Army Quartermaster or other Government Agency.

Nichols said however, that owners who have less than 26 hen turkeys and no authorized processor within 100 miles may obtain a release from the State Suptrvisor for local consumption.
