I was talking to Pete Berg of the Hermiston Grain & Feed company the other day, and he showed me a list of pasture seeding benefit payments for soil conservation that I thought you would be interested to see, so here goes:

Lilly's Economy Pasture (low)	25 lbs.	5.00

Why not check with Pete the next time you're in town and see about these benefit payments. Sounds pretty good to me.
