HOME EC. UNITS END YEAR'S WORK

With the Weston unit meeting, the work of the Home Economics Extension units of Umatilla county closed for the spring and summer months.

Ten groups, Weston, Hermiston, Pilot Rock, Stanfield, Pendleton, White Eagle, Pleasant View, Fruitvale, Umpine and Adams, have been active during the current year, as have correspondence clubs in outlying districts.

The work sponsored by the Extension Service of Oregon State college is conducted from September through May. Due to war conditions the work is closing one month earlier than usual. The Extension program covering 5 major fields—foods, clothing, homemaking, family relationships and recreation, is brought to Umatilla homemakers through organized unit groups which adopt the requirements of the program.

Ever Hear of 'KABOBS'?

Kabobs (also known as Shish Kebab, and En Brochettes): Let 2-inch squares of lamb soak for half-hour or longer in a barbecue-type sauce containing oil, vinegar and garlic. String squares of lamb on skewer alternately with thick slices of tomato, onion and orange. Broil for 10 to 15 minutes, turning once.

Barbecued Breast of Lamb: Plan for 1/2 lb. of lamb per person. Leave whole, or cut into pieces for serving. Place in single layer in drip pan; sprinkle with salt and pepper (do not add water and do not cover). Roast in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 1 hour or until well browned and meat is done, turning occasionally.
