5. Apply vent stoppage and rat-proofing to all buildings.  
6. Natural enemies of the rat should be protected when they are not themselves destructive.  
7. Maintain buildings in a rat-proof condition and destroy rats as soon as observed to be present.

It's so obvious, when you stop to think about it: a dozen oranges could be small and light, or big and heavy—but a pound of oranges will always give you your money's worth. And that's just as true for all fresh fruits and vegetables!

**Let's enjoy fresh spring vegetables**

NOW THAT fresh vegetables are coming on the market in good quantity again, it's a good time to explore some of the possibilities of using them in fresh and lively ways.

First, though, here are some general suggestions that are worthy of a second glance:

Rinse freshly-bought vegetables in cold water (don't soak them); wrap in damp cloth or replace in paper bag or put in vegetable compartment; and store in refrigerator.

If they must be peeled, don't peel them till the last minute.

Cook them quickly in the least possible amount of water (exceptions are spinach and strong-flavored vegetables like cabbage, which are best cooked in plenty of water, uncovered).

To hold the bright color in red cabbage and beets, add 1/2 tsp. vinegar or lemon juice for each cup of shredded vegetable, to the boiling water.

STRING beans, with strings removed, will taste better if you slit down the middle or at an angle, before cooking them!

CALICO VEGETABLE HASH  
Combine 1 cup each of diced cooked turnips, carrots, beets and potatoes; moisten with 4 tbsps. meat stock or water enriched with a beef cube. Melt 3 tbsps. shortening in hot frying pan; spread the vegetables evenly over the pan's surface and cover. Reduce heat and cook slowly 15 to 20 minutes or until brown crust is formed. Loosen hash from pan, fold in half, turn out on hot platter and serve. Serves 6.

SPINACH PANCAKES  
Drain and chop 2 cups cooked spinach very fine and add 1 cup dry bread crumbs, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper and 4 eggs slightly beaten. Drop by table-spoonfuls into a hot greased frying pan and fry until brown, turning once. Serve with highly seasoned tomato sauce. Serves 6.

## Down On Mac's Farm

An interesting article came to my attention the other day, relative to rats. It seems the estimate of food and feed destruction by rats in the United States last year was \$200,000,000. It is for this reason that the federal fish and wild-life service is urging a nation-wide war on this pest, which is found in every state of the union and in nearly every part of each state. Here is a seven-point outline of the department's recommendation:

1. Permanent rat-control organizations should be provided for large cities and rural districts.
2. Remove food from rats by keeping garbage covered and by keeping food enclosed in rat-proof containers so far as possible.
3. The rats themselves should be destroyed by use of poisoned baits and traps. If it is desired to avoid the slight risk of rats dying in inaccessible places, traps should be used. Rat burrows and hiding places should be fumigated with poisonous gases.
4. Remove trash and avoid the accumulation of useful materials that may serve as harborage.
