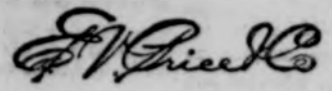

TURKEY HENS SENT TO ARMY

Most of the turkey hens which are usually marketed at this season of the year in Umatilla county have already been delivered to authorized processors for redelivery to the U. S. Army Quartermaster Corps, reports Lewis A. Nichols in charge of the Pendleton Office of Distribution, WFA.

Mr. Nichols points out that there may be some which are not marketed yet and in accordance with War Food Order Number 97 these should be sold to an authorized receiver. A list of the latter may be secured from the County Agricultural Agents office or the Office of Distribution in Pendleton.

Nichols further states that the producer who has less than 25 hens and is located more than 100 miles from an authorized processor may obtain a release to sell locally by writing to
