ECHO NEWS ITEMS

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon for Mrs. William W. Esselstyn, 73, who died at her home here Friday after a long illness. Rev. Earl Cotton, pastor of the Echo Methodist church, officiated at the service which was held at the Palsom chapel in Pendleton. A short service was also held at Echo cemetery, attended by many of the local friends who could not make the trip to Pendleton. Pall bearers were Sloan Thomson, Edward Liesegang, Homer Coppinger, Marvin Laughlin, Joe Middleton and Harry Andrews. Minnie A. Perigo was born at Lowell, Wisconsin, November 25, 1871, was married to William W. Es-

selstyn in 1896, and came to Oregon soon afterwards. In 1912 the Esselstyns came to Echo and resided here about 10 years, while Mr. Esselstyn was manager of the local Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co. yards. After leaving here they lived in Hood River and Pendleton until 1942 when Mr. Esselstyn retired and they returned to Echo to reside. Mrs. Esselstyn joined the Echo Methodist church in 1912 and served as librarian of Echo library for several years. She was also active in the American Legion auxiliary and was chaplain of the Echo post. Survivors are her husband and three children, Clifford of Echo, Earl of Pendleton and Rodney, now in the navy at Bremerton, and three sisters, Mrs. Maud Davis and Mrs. Allie Harold of Walla Walla, and Mrs. Har-

riett Damp of Ft. Atkinson, Wis. All of these except Mrs. Damp were present for the funeral.

Miss Vera Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy A. Smith of Echo, became the bride of Harold F. Schiel, son of Mrs. M. D. Perd of Woodburn, at an impressive candlelight ceremony in the Episcopal church at Pasco at 8:00 p. m., June 30. The Rev. Dyson read the service and Miss Kathryn Cooney sang "Ava Maria" and "Because". The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of traditional white satin, styled with long sleeves, fitted bodice and train, with a fingertip veil which fell from a coronet caught with orange blossoms, and carried a cascade bouquet of pink gladiolus and baby breath. Mrs. George Ryzek, her attendant, wore a gown of rose taffeta and carried a bouquet of white carnations. The best man was Elmer Fritze of Hermiston. The bride's mother wore a pastel blue two piece dress of embroidered silk with hat to match, and corsage of talisman roses. 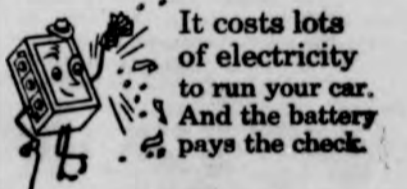
